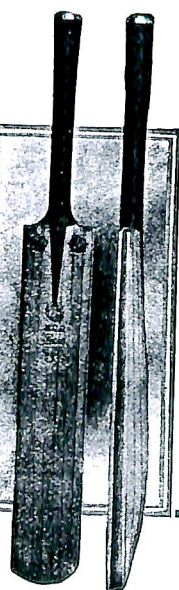

**NORTHUMBERLAND v. YORKSHIRE
SECOND ELEVEN.**

GREAT INNINGS BY HARDISTY.

In a match remarkable for the rapidity with which runs were scored, the Yorkshire Second Eleven yesterday assumed a commanding lead in opposing Northumberland on the county ground at Newcastle. There the Yorkshire team generally acquit themselves well, but yesterday they excelled themselves, and in scoring 443 runs in three hours and a half they gave the Newcastle holiday crowd an exhibition of free hitting such as they have not seen for several years. Northumberland, it is only just to add, were not at their best. Had Mr. Skinner, Elsey, and Marshall been present to sustain the attack, Yorkshire's task would have been more difficult. As it is the visiting team, with two wickets in hand and a lead of 316 runs, have a handsome victory in prospect.

The Northumberland County Ground has been the scene of many brilliant batting displays by Yorkshire visitors. Mr. Frank has made big scores there, and only two seasons ago Bates established his reputation at Newcastle by scoring a brilliant century in his first match. All previous Yorkshire performances at Newcastle, however, are eclipsed by Hardisty's innings of 193, in regard to which one cannot pay a finer tribute than by recording the eloquent fact that it only lasted two hours and a quarter, and that it was entirely without blemish until the very last over.

Hardisty, though he has been known for several seasons as a most punishing batsman, has never previously shown himself in such a light as this. Possibly he felt that such an effort was needed to re-establish his reputation as a county player, for of late he had scarcely been doing himself justice. It has taken him long to return to his true form, but now that his revival has come it is most pronounced. Let it be said at once that yesterday's innings was by far the best he has ever done. His biggest score previously was one of 125 in a Leeds League match, though his 84 against Leicestershire last season will rank as of better consequence.

Yesterday's innings was a great and polished effort, which prominently portrayed Hardisty as a batsman of undoubted quality. His strokes were all perfectly timed and well played. Never was there a nick or a mistake which jeopardised his stay at the wicket. From the first he wielded the bat with such confidence, and hit with such power, that he had made 50 whilst Grimshaw, who partnered him for the first wicket, had been making 19. He had then only been batting half-an-hour, though the greater care which he had to exercise in dealing with changes in the bowling caused him to occupy 55 minutes in scoring his second 50. He added his third 50 in twenty-five minutes, so completely had he then mastered the bowling, and indeed from the century onwards he had the bowling completely at his mercy.

It was only when he was nearing his double century that he began to take undue liberties. Mr. Ullathorne ought to have stumped him when his contribution had reached 182, but it mattered little that he did not do so. For in the next over from the Rev. H. White the batsman misjudged his stroke, and put up the ball for Mr. Nesbit to make a brilliant catch, running from cover-point. Hardisty retired with the score of 193 runs, made in exactly two hours and a quarter. He scored most freely on the leg side, and some of his glancing strokes to the boundary were quite as praiseworthy as the hard straight drives which were his principal strokes. Towards the close of his innings he drove both Mr. White and Milne clean out of the field for six, and his other hits included 29 fours, 2 threes, and 11 twos.

Hardisty's association with Grimshaw for the first wicket produced 120 runs, of which the latter contributed 45 in good style, and for the second wicket Hardisty and Rudston added 200 runs in an hour and ten minutes, for the one was scoring just as fast as the other. Rudston's was the second best innings of the day, marked as it was by beautiful batting and rapid scoring for his 73 runs, which were made in an hour and twenty minutes, and included 13 fours.

Yorkshire Second's score then stood at 341 for three wickets, but more good scoring was to follow. Mr. J. S. Auty, the Birstall amateur, who is making a re-appearance in the team after a lapse of six years, knocked up 21 in good style, and Richardson scored 39 in as many minutes. Mr. Tattersall, too, was forcing the pace when he was taken behind the wickets for 20. When stumps were drawn Yorkshire's score stood at 443 for eight wickets.

The wicket was not so hard and plumb for the Novocastrians as it subsequently became for the Yorkshiremen, and drying rapidly after the previous evening's rain, the pitch gave some assistance, particularly to the slow break bowler, Harrison. He was rather severely treated at the outset by Mr. Anderson, who drove him out of the field for six, and with the addition of 6 fours knocked up 31 runs out of a total of 39 in the first twenty minutes. He was then clean bowled by Harrison, and Mr. Gillespie, who had opened the innings, was out with the score unchanged to a brilliant one-handed catch in the slips by Mr. Auty off Brown.

The only other batsman to give trouble was Mr. J. Gilman, who, when seemingly nicely set, was bowled for 25 by the first ball delivered by Booth. Mr. Nesbit was at the wickets nearly an hour for six, in the making of which he had given two chances. All the batsmen found runs very difficult to obtain, and the

innings closed just after luncheon, after having lasted two hours. That the score was kept within those narrow limits was in large measure due to the smartness shown in the field. Present score and analysis:—

**NORTHUMBERLAND v. YORKSHIRE
SECOND ELEVEN.**

VISITORS' HANDSOME VICTORY.

In good time yesterday the Yorkshire Second Eleven finished off their match on the county ground at Newcastle, and won a handsome victory over Northumberland by an innings and 163 runs. They only just got the Novocastrians out in time though, for immediately on the fall of the last wicket the rain fell heavily, and continued throughout the afternoon. For their success the Yorkshire Second have chiefly of course, to thank Hardisty, whose great innings of 193 the previous day had put them in a commanding position. That brilliant performance was followed yesterday by all-round smartness in the field, and on a perfectly plumb wicket it was much to the credit of the attacking party that they got rid of Northumberland a second time for 157 runs.

On the resumption of play yesterday morning Yorkshire continued their innings, but ten minutes sufficed to get out the last two men and close the innings for 447. Northumberland were left to face a deficit of 320 runs, and though Mr. Gillespie and Mr. Gilman made a rare stand they never had any prospect of saving the game. After Mr. Anderson's dismissal with the total at 12, runs came easily, though the wickets of Milne and Mr. Nesbit fell at 59 and 63 respectively. Mr. Gillespie and Mr. Gilman added 44 in three-quarters of an hour for the fourth wicket, and in retiring to a good ball from Brown the former had made 34, the highest score of the day. More useful, perhaps, was the innings of Mr. Gilman, who kept his end up for an hour and twenty minutes, in which time he made 24. He was ninth man out at 157, and at that figure the innings ended, the execution having chiefly been done by Harrison and Brown, whose four wickets each had cost 60 and 67 runs respectively. Yorkshire 2nd Outplay Northumberland.

FINE INNINGS BY HARDISTY.

The Northumberland County eleven had a most disastrous day's play at Jesmond, yesterday, in the first stage of their match with the second eleven of Yorkshire, the close of the day's cricket finding the visitors in the possession of a lead of 316 runs with two wickets still to fall.

Northumberland's display at the wickets was most disappointing, their innings, lasting just two hours, realising no more than 127 runs, an unexpectedly low score on a good wicket for a team that had performed so well against both Cheshire and Durham. As is his wont, Stanley Anderson hit out vigorously in the opening partnership with F. W. Gillespie, scoring 31, by the aid of one six and six 4's, out of 39 before he was bowled by Harrison. Wickets then fell quickly, Gillespie being out at the same score, Richardson two runs later, J. Gilman, who batted well for 25, fourth at 78, and S. Nesbit next six runs later, half the side thus being out for 79 runs. No improvement was shown by the remaining wickets, partnerships that opened in promising manner failing to realise expectations. Yorkshire's fielding was really excellent, some very good catches being effected, especially good being that in the slips by Turner, by which Milne was dismissed.

This is a better attempt to offer no excuse for the feeble display of a Northumbrian team regarded as a strong batting one was amply shown by the ease and pace with which runs were made by the Yorkshiremen, who, going in at twenty minutes to three, were batting from then, with the exception of a ten minutes stoppage owing to defective light, until half-past six, during which time 443 runs were scored for the fall of eight wickets. Everything else in the innings was directed by the superb display of Hardisty, who has not shown any very flattering form for the first eleven this season. He and Grimshaw opened the innings, and Northumberland's score was passed by two runs before Grimshaw was out with 45, scored in an hour and five minutes.

A very fine stand was made for the second wicket when Hardisty was joined by Rudston, runs coming at a remarkably fast rate, and 200 were added to the score before Hardisty's innings came to an end. How attractive and exhilarating was his display may at once be gathered from the statement that he scored 193 out of 229 in two hours and a quarter, the only noticeable blemish in his innings being a chance of stumping a few runs before he dismissed. His innings, indeed, was one of the soundest exhibitions of batting ever seen on the County ground at Jesmond. Particularly masterly were his strokes to leg, and his chief hits were two 6's, twenty nine 4's, two 3's, and eleven 2's.

Rudston was third out at 341, after being in an hour and twenty minutes for a scanty innings of 78, in which he hit thirteen 4's, and in which the only chance was one in the slips when 58 off the bowling of White. Some useful stands followed, and in the end the Yorkshiremen were left with a lead of 316 runs, with two wickets in hand. The play was followed keenly by a good ring of spectators, the large crowd again pointing to an increased interest in county cricket in Newcastle this season. Score:—

NORTHUMBERLAND'S REVERSE.

Yorkshire 2nd Win at Jesmond by Innings and 163 Runs.

The Northumberland County eleven, so really victorious in their two other engagements this season over Durham and Cheshire, sustained a crushing defeat at Jesmond, yesterday, from the second eleven of Yorkshire, the reserve men of the champion county winning by no less a margin than an innings and 163 runs.

This, of course, was in no way an unexpected result after the trend of the first day's play, though it was undoubtedly hoped the Northumbrians upon a second visit to the wickets would make some atonement for their disappointing batting on Monday. This they cannot be said to have accomplished, a total of merely 127 runs more being compiled than in their previous venture.

On Monday, Northumberland were dismissed for 127 runs, the Yorkshiremen then showing that there was no excuse to be offered for this display by scoring 443 for the fall of eight wickets, the innings being notable for the fine batting of Hardisty, whose 193 old habits of the ground unhesitatingly pronounced to have been the result of one of the soundest exhibitions of batting ever seen at the enclosure.

Yesterday, the Yorkshiremen increased their score to ten wickets by only four runs, and on a wicket still in good order for run-getting, the Northumbrians retired just after half-past twelve upon a task of scoring 320 runs to avert the disgrace of an innings' defeat. Again, however, the venture proved a triumph for the Yorkshire bowling, which, supported by cool, clean fielding, never showed the slightest sign of being mastered. Indeed, Northumberland's batting was unaccountably dull and uninteresting, and can only be put down as one of those lapses of form on the part of the whole team that now and again occur in the career of every county. By three o'clock the whole side was out for 127 runs.

S. Anderson failed to give his usual good start to the eleven, making only seven out of 12, and Milne, after showing promising form in making 29, was second out at 59. S. Nesbit was third to go at 65, and then the best batting of the innings was shown by F. W. Gillespie, who made 31 out of 44 for the fourth wicket before he was bowled at 107 by really the best ball sent down in the whole game, the ball breaking and shooting in. J. Gilman, who had gone in upon the fall of the third wicket at 65, was playing with unusual steadiness, but he could not find a partner to make a stay of any note. He was in himself an hour and forty minutes for 24 runs before he was ninth out at 150, and the only other feature of note in the innings was the batting of R. Foster, who, with some good hitting, made 17 runs. Score:—
