GLAMORGAN MEN IN FRONT AT EXETER.

The wicket was still very soft at Exeter on Tuesday, and the start was delayed until half-past eleven to enable it to recover. Runs came slowly, and it was just on lunch time when Glamorgan's innings closed. A capital last wicket stand was made by Creber and J. Bancroft, the latter hitting with vigour, scoring 14 in one over off Hartley. Devon opened weakly, Miles being dismissed at 10, while 4 runs later Ball was

taken behind the wicket. Light hit with vigour, scoring 20 of the first 47 runs, getting four boundaries. Davies and Orchard made a good stand, the former especially playing bright cricket. Fours came frequently, several being run. Creber and Nash twice changed ends, but could not effect a separation, and the century went up after two hours' batting. CRICKET NOTES

DEVON v. GLAMORGAN.

The English team selected to meet Australia in the third Test match, which commences at Leeds on Thursday, is certainly stronger than the eleven defeated at Lord's. A. O. Jones, Haigh, King, and G. Gunn, who were in the team a fortnight since, have not been chosen for this week's match, their places being filled by C. B. Fry, Rhodes, G. I. Jessop, and W. Brearley. The Selection Committee were adversely criticised for excluding the Gloucestershire and Lancashire men in the eleven at Lord's, and there is no doubt that the selection of the four last-named has greatly improved the strength of the side. Brearley is the best fast bowler we command, and, consequently, the English attack is not likely to prove anything like so weak as on the last occasion. G. I. Jessop is another player who ought not to have been allowed to stand down at Lord's, as his tremendous hitting powers are likely to upset the bowling and fielding of any team. Jessop is also a useful change bowler and a very fine fieldsmen. In fact, the team is exceedingly strong. In addition to Helf, there are Brearley, Hirst, and Rhodes as bowlers. Every man, with the exception of Brearley, has also made a century in first-class cricket.

The inability to raise a really strong batting side to represent Devon in the match against Glamorgan, which commenced at the County Ground, Exeter, yesterday, resulted in many people not placing much confidence in the home side. However, Devon made an excellent start, but, owing to rain greatly interfering with play, there is not much likelihood of the game being finished to-day. The Selection Committee cast their eyes all over the county to obtain the best possible men, and no one can say that their efforts have been lacking in the endeavour to secure the very strongest side. Of course, great disappointment has been created through the absence of C. V. J. Hooman, H. V. I. Watts, F. H. Carroll, and W. F. Sturt, the four batsmen who opened the Devon innings when the Welshmen figured at the Pennsylvania enclosure last season. On that occasion Devon won by 53 runs after a most interesting match owing to the uncertainty which prevailed until the last hour of the game. Devon compiled 115 and 183 in their two innings, and Glamorgan replied with 72 and 173.

With the exception of Harold Watts, the four mentioned above did not acquit themselves too well with the willow, as the three only made 55 between them in the two innings. A feature of that match was the remarkably fine fielding of Hooman. Although many would have liked to have seen the four taking part in the match now in progress, their inability to play, comparing their batting at Exeter in the game last season, is not such a serious loss as some people may think. However, considering the really brilliant batting of Hooman at Oxford, his inclusion in the side would certainly have led people to place more confidence in the Devon team. Hooman is certainly the best batsman qualified for Devon, and the fact that he has been making runs consistently against the cream of English bowling leads one to form the opinion that he would have been of material assistance to the home county yesterday and to-day.

Watts is abroad, and has played very little, if any, cricket this season. W. F. Sturt certainly batted exceedingly well against South Devon on Saturday, but, generally speaking, his form this season has not been exceptionally good. The same may also be said about F. H. Carroll. We have instead J. P. Orchard, E. C. Ball, D. Boles, and Capt. J. C. Hartley. Of course, the inability to play of those first selected creates disappointment, but when we glance at the names of the four who may be termed the substitutes, it cannot be said there is cause for discontentment. Although Watts made 76 in his two innings against Glamorgan last year, each of the four last-named has been making a lot of runs this season, and I venture to say that as much confidence can be placed in their batting as in that of the South Devon man last season.

Where can be found a better fieldsmen than J. P. Orchard? On numerous occasions I have witnessed his very fine work in the deep field, and the manner in which the little amateur is able to cover the ground and gather the ball is marvellous. The Sidmouth player is still the best deep field-

man we have in the county, and, except Capt. Hartley, I have not seen another amateur anything like so good in recent years. Capt. Hartley has been batting and bowling well in some local matches, and, considering his past reputation, his inclusion in the team has given satisfaction. D. Boles is also one of the best batsmen we have, and, remembering his reach, runs can certainly be expected from him. However, the wicket is not favourable to tall scoring, and, therefore, we must not expect too much from those who have been chosen simply for their batting.

The play of E. C. Ball, at Dawlish, has been watched with much interest by those responsible for selecting the county teams, and his inclusion should stimulate people at the seaside resort to take a much keener interest in cricket. The absence of Hawksworth—who is no longer qualified for Devon—has created disappointment in some quarters, but it is not generally known that the popular professional did not play against Glamorgan at Exeter last year, another bowler then being found in L. H. Amory. On that occasion the last-named did not have really a fair trial, as he did not bowl until the Glamorgan second innings, and when N. V. H. Richey and Bancroft had got set at the wickets. Amory has been doing very well this season, and, considering the scarcity of fast trundlers, the Committee would do well to consider the advisability of playing him in the near future. Amory is bowling quite as well as F. R. Coates, of Exmouth, who had to decline his place for the present match. Last season Coates obtained 14 wickets for 251 runs. This was not a very fine achievement, considering that Carmarthen were Devon's opponents in one of the matches he played in. His chief success was at Newport, when he captured nine wickets for 136 runs.

Less than two hours' play was possible yesterday, but in that time half the Glamorgan side was disposed of, for when rain stopped play for the day at 1 o'clock, five of the Welshmen's wickets were down for 53 runs. So well did the home county bowl and field, that four of the visitors were sent back for 41, and it was only when J. G. Symonds stepped in "where others had apparently feared to tread," and went for the bowling, that the Glamorgan total approached anything like respectable dimensions. The left-handed batsman was none too sure in the first over he had to play, but afterwards batted in attractive style, scoring 39 out of the 42 runs added before play was stopped. The game will be resumed at 10.30 this morning.

Exeter were defeated by South Devon on Saturday. Many people thought they would win, as when South Devon's eighth wicket fell they required over 30 runs to gain the victory. However, Mills and J. Hodge contributed the runs necessary, and when the last-named was bowled the scores of the two teams were equal. Only one more run being needed South Devon gained the victory without further loss. The heavy rain last week made the wicket somewhat soft, and, as a result, runs were not too easy to secure. Exeter, although they lost Sergt-Major Busby when only ten runs had been scored, made a good stand for the second wicket. F. W. Sturt and S. Hopping compiled 445 between them. After the departure of the last-named Sturt found a very useful partner in Lieut. Mann, and the total score was increased by 30 before the third wicket fell.

The remainder of the side, with the exception of J. R. L. Perry, put up a rather weak resistance to the South Devon bowling, and the whole side were out for 163. Perry, who is played more for his bowling than batting, occasionally makes some very useful scores, and his contribution of 28 on Saturday was most commendable. South Devon lost the Rev. T. Cotton before they had opened their scoring. P. Hodge and H. E. Brunskill made a very good stand for the fifth wicket, but, on their partnership being severed, the home side still required over 70 runs to win. The tail of the team, waggled considerably, and, as stated, South Devon won after a very hard fight. Light obtained the best bowling analysis for Exeter, the professional securing four wickets for 57 runs. W. Ashford captured three wickets for 53.

After adding 9 runs to his score Sweet-Escott was out l.b.w. to Acton. H. Symons had his stumps distributed after contributing a useful 49; Maxwell hit up 14, and was then nicely taken by Davis off Hartley. With the score at 125 for nine wickets, Creber partnered J. MINOR COUNTIES' CHAMPIONSHIP.
DEVON v. GLAMORGAN.
WELSHMEN SECURE POINTS.

When the second day's play of this Minor Counties' Cricket Championship match entered upon, at the County Ground, Exeter, yesterday morning, there was little, if any, prospect of the game being fought out to a finish. On Monday rain had only permitted of about an hour and a half's cricket, during which time Glamorgan, who won the toss, and batted first, had secured 83 runs for the loss of five wickets. With a draw being the only likely result—unless, of course, one or other of the sides badly collapsed—interest centred in which County would secure the advantage on the first innings. There had not been much rain during the night, but when the hour arrived for play to commence the ground was still very soft, a slight shower was falling, and it was not until some time later that the Welshmen were able to resume their innings.

When the overnight not outs, H G Symonds (39) and E R Sweet-Escott (25), went to the wickets there was but a mere handful of spectators present, but during the afternoon their number was considerably augmented. Wickets fell cheaply, and when but one remained to go the total was only 125. The two last men made a capital stand, however, and, profiting by a dropped catch, and the missing of another possible chance, the score was raised to 170 before the innings closed. Devon commenced batting after luncheon on a wicket the reverse of being the better for wear, which gave the bowlers a considerable advantage over the batsmen. Two wickets fell for 14 runs, but, thanks to one or two good stands, the prospects of the home County's success at one time appeared rosy. The tail refused to wag, however, and all were out, between 5 and 6 o'clock, for 161, the game being consequently left drawn.

As to the actual play, Sweet-Escott and Symonds resumed the Welshmen's innings, opposed to the bowling of Boles and Hartley, the former opening from the Baracks end to Sweet-Escott, who got the third delivery away to leg for a single, while from the next Symonds added a couple to his total by means of a pretty stroke past point. Hartley's initial over realised two singles, and for a time runs came slowly. With 90 on the board Light again took up the attack from Boles. Both batsmen were playing very cautiously, and four maiden overs had been bowled before Symonds, who had twice been beaten by Light, drove the latter for a single. Aston then relieved the Exonian, who had been bowling well, without, however, getting any back, and with his first delivery caught Davies a nasty crack, while off the last ball of the over Symonds hit the first boundary of the morning. Play had been in progress just over half an hour when Sweet-Escott sent the century up by putting Hartley through the slips for two. At this period Symonds had 49 to his credit, and his partner 30. In the amateur's next over, however, he clean bowled the left hander before he could add to his score, the total being 101. The partnership had realised just 60 runs, and had turned what at one time looked like being a very feeble total into quite a respectable one.

On Monday Symonds had opened none too promisingly, but soon settled down to bat with confidence, his play being the one bright feature of what, up to that period, had been a dull exhibition of cricket. Yesterday, however, he played very quietly, the addition of ten to his overnight score taking also on 40 minutes to make. Maxwell, who succeeded him, immediately gave a difficult chance to Garratt at cover point off Hartley, and then opened his account, with a hot drive to the off-boundary. In Aston's next

over Sweet-Escott succumbed to a confident appeal for leg before wicket, having played a very useful innings of 32, which he had occupied just two hours in making. With Nash filling the gap, the game brightened up considerably, Maxwell hitting out freely. The latter's stay was a short one, however, for at 119 he was smartly snapped at the wicket by Davies, off Hartley, for 11. J. Bancroft, who was next in, opened his account and sent 120 up with an on-drive off the amateur for two, while the next ball he put round to square leg for a similar number. Nash, at 125, put an easy one back to Aston, which the Services man made no mistake about holding, and then Bancroft and Creber were responsible for a useful stand for the last wicket. Two or three changes were made in the attack, but the score steadily mounted to 150. Ashford failed to hold a hot one from Bancroft off Hartley (134), and, profiting by this let-off, the Welsh batsman lit out freely, sending the last-named bowler three times to the boundary in one over. Eventually, however, a misunderstanding resulted in Creber being run out, and the innings closed for 170, having lasted three hours and a half. Bancroft was not out 35. Luncheon was then taken.

The home County commenced their innings none too well, for but ten runs had been scored when Boles, who had gone in first with Ball, was sent back by Nash, who shared the attack with Creber. Light was next man in, and opened his account, a couple of overs later, by putting Nash away to the off-boundary for four, but nothing had been added when Ball was out to a catch at the wicket, two of the homesters being thus dismissed for 14. With Orchard coming in both batsmen played carefully for a time, but Light occasionally hit out, and 30 was signalled as the result of a lovely drive by the Exeter professional, which threatened to do damage to the Bowling Club's pavilion. Practically the whole of the scoring was being done by the left-handed batsman, and when the total stood at 40 he had 25 to his credit, having been especially severe on Nash. A double change was made in the bowling, Hacker relieving Creber at the pavilion end, while the latter took over from Nash. The first delivery the new bowler sent down Light put away to the leg boundary, but with his fifth the Welshman caught and bowled the professional, who had made 30, three wickets being now down for 47. With Davies filling the vacancy, Orchard sent the half-century up by putting Hacker away to leg for two, the Sidmouth man hitting out with more freedom than had characterised his display while associated with Light. Nash was again called upon to share in the attack, going on vice Hacker, who had, apparently, done what was required of him, upset a partnership which had threatened danger.

Davies had a narrow escape of being caught and bowled, while he was let off in the deep field a couple of minutes later, thanks to the sun being in the eyes of the Welsh fieldsmen. With the score in the seventies, the rate of run-getting slowed down again, but the batsmen raised the enthusiasm of the spectators by getting a four apiece, and 80 went up after about an hour and a half's play. Two or three changes were made in the bowling, but both batsmen were displaying plenty of confidence. Davies, in particular, treating any loose deliveries with scant courtesy. At 4.10

Orchard sent the century up with a hit to leg for three, his score at this stage being 29, and Davies' 30. An appeal for stumping against the amateur proved fruitless. With the total at 114, however, Maxwell succeeded in getting him caught at square leg, the Sidmouthian retiring with 34 to his credit—runs which had been secured when much wanted, and the result of a stay of something like two hours at the wicket. Shelley was the new comer, and soon opened his account, but with the total at 127 was sent back by Nash for 4. Garratt was still less fortunate, having his wickets disturbed by the same bowler before he had scored. Hartley hit a couple of boundaries, and then returned a ball to Nash, who well held him low down, the total then being 135 for seven wickets. Things were looking none too bright for the homesters, for, although there was no prospect of the match being played out to a finish, 36 runs were still required to secure the points accruing to a side securing the lead on the first innings in a game which cannot be completed. The Devon "skipper" had only made 4, when he, too, had to retire. From the pavilion it looked as if the ball fell as a result of the wicket-keeper coming in contact with the stumps, but an appeal to the umpire on this point resulted in a decision unfavourable to the home batsman. Aston hit merrily for an over or two, but at 159 was bowled by Nash and succeeded by Ashford,

18 runs still being required. Only two had been added, however, when Davies was clean bowled by Maxwell, the Devon total being thus nine short of that put up by the Welshmen. There being no further time for play, the match resulted in a draw, but Glamorgan secure the points above referred to. The game had been a pleasantly contented one, the closing stages being particularly exciting. The homesters were somewhat unlucky to lose the points, for had either of the chances given by J. Bancroft been accepted it would have meant at least 20 off the visitors' total, while, in addition, Devon had all the work of the wicket.

MINOR COUNTIES' CHAMPIONSHIP.

DEVON v. GLAMORGAN.

Devonshire opened their Minor Counties' fixtures yesterday, when a start was made with the first of the two matches against Glamorgan, on the County Ground, Exeter. Unfortunately, however, but little progress could be made with the game, heavy rain commencing to fall about 1 o'clock, and continuing until 4 o'clock, when, with the prospects of further play out of the question, stumps were drawn, it being arranged to make an early commencement this morning, with the hope of the match being played out to a finish. The home-sters are much below full strength, the most notable absentees being C. V. L. Hooman, the Oxford "blue," Lieutenant Wilson, of the Royal Navy; Lieutenant Parker, of the Rifle Brigade; W. F. Sturt, and F. H. Carroll. Glamorgan, on the other hand, have a representative team on tour. In the hour and a half in which play was possible yesterday, the Welshmen fared none too well, for, winning the toss, and going in on a soft wicket, they lost five wickets for 83 runs, the first four going down for 41.

The Welshmen commenced their innings by sending in T. A. L. Whittington and N. V. H. Riches to face the bowling of Aston and Light, the former opening from the pavilion end, and to Whittington. The first over was a maiden, and off Light's fourth delivery Tamworth well held Riches at mid-off, with the score-sheet blank. E. R. Sweet-Escott filled the vacancy, and immediately opened his account, putting the first ball he received through the slips for three. The new-comer continued to do most of the scoring, and with the total at 16 Ashford took over the attack from the United Services player, the latter having bowled three overs at a cost of nine runs, but without, apparently, finding the pitch to his liking. The change had the effect of reducing the rate of scoring, for four more overs were sent down before Sweet-Escott added to his total, Light, up to this point, having only had seven runs scored off him, whilst Davis had missed a possible, but difficult, chance of stumping Sweet-Escott off the Exeter man. At 12 o'clock, and with the score standing at 19, there was a sharp shower of rain, which drove the players to the pavilion.

After a wait of about ten minutes, the game was resumed. Runs continued to come slowly, the first three parts of an hour only realising 27. At this stage Hartley took on for Ashford, and with his third delivery scattered Whittington's wickets with a ball which beat him all the way. W. Bancroft was next in, and had a narrow escape off the first ball he was called upon to face, whilst he put up the next in the slips, it narrowly escaping a resting place in Light's hands. His stay was a very brief one, however, for in Hartley's following over he was out l b w, with the total standing at 35. But five runs had been added when Rees was run out, his place at the wicket being taken by Hacker, who had only scored a run, when Light dislodged his bails. With H. G. Symonds joining Sweet-Escott, play brightened up a bit, but both Hartley and Light were keeping a length which permitted of few liberties being taken with the bowling. Sixty was on the board when Ashford resumed at the pavilion end, while Light, whose next over proved a fairly expensive one, gave way to Boles, with the score at 83. The new bowler had only sent down one delivery, however, when the rain again came on once more driving the players to shelter. It being then ten minutes past one, it was decided to take the luncheon interval, in the hope that the rain would clear off. Unfortunately, however, this was not to be, for it came down steadily, and continued to do so until 4 o'clock, when, there being no prospect of further cricket, play was abandoned for the day. Symonds, who had batted in a much freer style than any of his colleagues, was not out with 39 to his credit, while Sweet-Escott, who had scored but a couple since joined by the left-handed batsman, was not out 23. Light was the most successful of the bowlers. His first twelve overs included eight maidens, only five deliveries being scored off up to this period—3, 1, 3, 2, 3. In all he bowled sixteen overs, of which ten were maidens, while his two wickets were secured at a cost of 25 runs. Hartley sent down seven overs, taking two wickets for 23 runs. Scores:—
