Glamorgan on Saturday gained a fine victory over Carmarthenshire in the Minor Counties Championship contest by an innings and nineteen runs. Rain fell during most of the morning at St. Helen's, Swansea, and delayed the resumption of the match until two o'clock in the afternoon. Glamorgan declared their innings closed at Friday's total. Carmarthenshire put in Hugh Howell and Ike Evans as their first batsmen, Nash and Creber bowling. Scoring was very slow. The first wicket yielded no less than 71 runs, to which Ike Evans contributed 30, when he was smartly stumped by Bancroft off Creber. E. Gee then joined Howell, and when only eleven runs had been added the latter was run out. The bowlers now worked most effectively, and changed the complexion of the game. The next three wickets fell without any advance in the score, which remained at 82. Gee was clean bowled by Creber, while John was run out by a smart throw-in, and Davies caught by Creber at mid-on off Nash. Captain Hughes-Morgan rather steadied the cricket after this melancholy procession, but the score was only 94 when he succumbed to one of Nash's deliveries. Afterwards Nash and Creber mowed down the wickets, and the innings came to a rapid close. At 103 E. F. Longcroft was bowled by Nash, at 115 J. Bevan was not equal to one from Creber's end, and J. Davies, without addition to the score, suffered a similar fate at the hands of the Swansea bowler. The last man, S. Mills, was run out 1 run later, and so the innings came to a close.

MINOR COUNTIES.

GLAMORGAN'S GOOD SCORE AGAINST CARMARTHEN.

Result of corresponding match last year—Carmarthenshire, 96 and 114; Glamorgan, 111. Glamorgan won by an innings and one run.

Wickets were pitched in this match at St. Helen's, Swansea, at about a quarter to twelve on Friday. The skies were overcast and sunny by turns, and it was difficult to foresee what weather the day would bring forth. The teams were fairly strong, there being a good deal of Swansea about the Glamorgan team, and a good deal of the other team at Glamorgan about their opponents.

Norman Riches and Bancroft appeared first at the wicket, the bowling being entrusted to E. Gee and Hugh Howell. The batsmen started well, but when the score had reached 22 Bancroft called Riches for a rather short run, and suffered the penalty, Mills fielding smartly at mid-on, knocking down his wicket.

Neither Percy Morris, Stanley Rees, nor Maxwell proved stayers, and Gibson lost them one after the other before the score reached the century, J. Davies, who had gone on to bowl instead of Hugh Howell, bowling Rees, the other two being dismissed by E. Gee, and Maxwell being smartly taken behind the wicket. The century was passed at one o'clock, A. Gibson having joined his Cardiff confrere, and the score mounted rapidly.

Mills took Davies's place, and Howell that of Gee, who injured his hand in stopping a ball. Gibson was bowled by Howell with the score at 143, and at lunch time the Glamorgan score was 168 for five wickets. M. E. White assisted Riches for some time after lunch, and the latter was able to run up an individual score of 119 before rain came on and compelled a retirement. He had played beautiful cricket, chiefly hitting boundaries. White (who had made 17) and J. Bancroft had been sent back by good balls from Gee, and seven wickets were down for 228 when play stopped. TO-DAY'S CRICKET.

GLAMORGAN v. CARMARTHENSHIRE

Splendid Batting by Norman Riches

The first of the two games allotted to Swansea in connection with the minor counties competition was reached on Friday when Carmarthenshire made their maiden appearance at St. Helen's. It is only a season ago since they entered the tournament and their play since has stamped them as one of the weakest, if not actually the weakest, of the minor counties. Glamorgan included half a dozen Swansea men—three amateurs and three professionals. In accordance with the rules governing the competition, a start has to be made on the first day at 11.30, and on the second day half-an-hour earlier.

The failure of Hacker, of Plymouth-Merthyr, to put in an appearance brought M. E. White into the side, so that Swansea's representation was increased to seven. This was White's maiden appearance. Glamorgan secured first knock on a good wicket, and a start was made with N. V. H. Riches and Bancroft. Hugh Howell and E. Gee shared the attack. With only 22 runs recorded Bancroft had the misfortune to be "thrown out." Riches and Percy Morris carried the total past the 50, but the Swansea man did not remain much longer. Stanley Rees, who succeeded him, left at 65, so that in less than an hour Glamorgan had lost three wickets. Curiously enough only Swansea wickets had fallen up to date. Jack Davies, of Pontyberem, bowled distinctly well, and the ground fielding being excellent runs were more difficult to get at the outset. Nevertheless good progress was made, Riches in particular shaping in a way which suggested that he was out centuring hunting. The downfall of Maxwell was wrought by Gee, who got the fast bowler caught at the wicket—82-4-8. Glamorgan were certainly not doing as well as had been expected of them. The century appeared at one o'clock without further loss. Joined by Arthur Gibson, Riches punished Gee rather badly, and with 110 up S. Mills, a native of Llanelli, who bowls slow left hand, relieved Davies, who was also proving rather expensive. Howell also went on vice Gee at the top end. In stopping a hard drive from Riches, Mills injured his right hand so badly that he had to retire. Just before the interval Captain Hughes-Morgan did some bowling. When the adjournment came Glamorgan had made 168 for the loss of five wickets.

A few minutes after resuming, Riches completed his hundred amid applause. Rain threatened at this point. The attendance numbered about 100.

At 5 o'clock rain fell, and the game had to be adjourned.

To-day's County Match at St. Helen's.

Play in the Minor Counties game between Glamorgan and Carmarthenshire, played at St. Helen's, was further intererred with by rain on Saturday morning. Overnight Glamorgan had in their first innings lost seven wickets for 221. Rain stopped play soon after three o'clock on Friday afternoon, and the second interruption made a draw a practical certainty.

After an inspection of the wicket on Saturday, it was decided to take an early lunch and then resume. Without further ado, the Glamorgan captain (A. Gibson) declared his innings closed with the overnight total unaltered. Riches was consequently not out with 141, and those who did not bat were J. D. Davies, Creber, and Nash. Carmarthenshire opened their venture with Hugh Howell and Ike Evans. Just before two o'clock, on a wicket, which though soft, was not very seriously affected by the rain. The attack was shared by Creber from the top end, and Nash. Runs came at a slow pace, neither of the batsmen seeming inclined to force matters. With the 30 just telegraphed, Maxwell went on in place of Nash.

Glamorgan's Fine Performance at St. Helens

Effective Bowling by Creber and Nash

(By "PENDEAGON.")

Until Carmarthenshire are in a position to engage some good all-round professionals, they cannot hope to enter into serious competition with the best of the minor counties. Allowance has, of course, to be made that they are the "infants" of the competition; but surely they can place a stronger eleven in the field than that which duty for them against Glamorgan at St. Helen's on Friday and Saturday? Why, for instance, was Soar, the ex-Hampshire bowler, overlooked? He is qualified by residence, having been engaged as a coach at Llandovery College for several years, and while he is naturally not getting younger, he is still a bowler to be feared. This is not said with the object of belittling such players as Hugh Howell and Ernest Gee, but rather with the idea of showing that professional bowlers are essential. The difficulty with Carmarthenshire just now is seemingly one of finance. They have so few good men qualified that they will probably have to go on losing for some time. If the county team is to continue, however, something should be done at once towards getting players to qualify by residence. Unlike Glamorgan, Carmarthenshire have no strong clubs at their back, if one excepts Llanelli and they are therefore badly handicapped from the start.

CARMARTHENSHIRE COLLAPSE.

Convincing proof of the all-round strength of Glamorgan is to be found in the fact that in about four hours they got their opponents out twice, after having themselves declared with their overnight total unchanged. Speaking generally, the most troublesome of the Carmarthenshire batsmen were Hugh Howell and Ike Evans. The former was very unfortunate in the first innings. He had got well set when a blunder on the part of Ernest Gee resulted in him being run out. Gee foolishly recreated after having gone half-way up the wicket, and the departure of Howell was the signal for a collapse, which was as unexpected as it was disastrous. The first wicket stand between Howell and Evans was so remunerative that everybody felt convinced that the match would have to be left undecided, but not only did the visiting county come a cropper on the first innings—they did even worse in the second. It was a poor performance of theirs to lose 20 wickets in so short a period, and it is to be hoped that the lessons to be derived from their failure will not be lost.

THE FOLLOW-ON.

When Carmarthenshire followed on, 112 behind, it looked as though Glamorgan would have to rest content with the three points derived from their victory on the first innings. The bowling of Creber and Nash, however, was irresistible, and by five past six Glamorgan had won with an innings and 19 runs to spare. Hugh Howell again put up a stubborn resistance, the only other members of the side to reach double figures being E. F. Longcroft and Davies (W.). The latter was out in a remarkable way. He had played a ball from Creber, but the spin carried it slowly towards his sticks. Davies might easily have arrested its further progress, but he stood like one entranced, and did not realise his mistake until the ball had been delogged. The conditions did not lend themselves to fast bowling, and as a consequence Maxwell was not tried at all in the second innings. Creber and Nash bowled unchanged with the following result:

RICHES' CENTURY.

As has already been explained Glamorgan did not bat at all on Saturday. Overnight they had lost seven wickets for 228, the outstanding feature being a brilliant not out innings of 141 by Norman Riches. The Cardiffian seems to have found form again. His innings was without blemish, and so confidently did he play the bowling, that he looked quite capable of putting up the double century. Curiously enough the most remunerative of the Swansea contingent of batsmen was M. E. White, who owed his inclusion to the withdrawal of Hacker, of Plymouth Merthyr. White may be said to have made a satisfactory debut, for in addition to shaping well with the bat, he was the very essence of keenness in the field. Another outstanding fielder was Stanley Rees, whose quickness caused two Carmarthenshire men to be run out. He "threw out" J. Bevan very smartly from cover-point. It should be explained that the reason why Percy Morris only bowled one over was that he strained a sinew in the leg. In consequence of this he did not field when Carmarthenshire batted a second time. Jack Bancroft kept wicket finely, and is considered well in the running for a place in the South Wales XI to oppose the Australians.
