

LEICESTERSHIRE v. ESSEX.

C.). Leicestershire replied with 67 for one wicket, Shields being bowled at 29. On Tuesday Knight was bowled at 83 and 6 runs later stumps were drawn for the day on account of rain. After a late start yesterday Leicestershire lost five wickets for 30, but Crawford and Astill made double-figures and the total reached 157. Going in again, Essex also found difficulty in run-getting, the fourth wicket falling at 33. Perrin, however, played a sound game, and Russell (A. C.) and Freeman made useful scores. This was due to the clever bowling of Broadbent and Drake, who received valuable assistance from their fieldmen.

Hardisty and Turner opened the innings for Yorkshire, and each showed fine batting. Despite repeated changes in the bowling, runs came freely, and the first wicket did not fall until 94 runs had been scored, Hardisty, with 40 to his credit, being the first to retire. YORKSHIRE II. v STAFFORDSHIRE

This match was played at Wakefield on Wednesday and Thursday, and resulted in the first defeat of Staffordshire this season, the home team gaining a decisive victory by ten wickets. This result seems to need a good deal of explanation after Staffordshire's excellent form in their preceding matches, and it is no doubt in a very considerable degree attributable to the absence of several regular players, notably Sidney Barnes, who was released by the County Committee in order that he might accept the invitation extended to him to play for the professionals of England against the amateurs at Lord's on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday. Barnes's absence is, of course, a great handicap to the side, and the absence of the captain, H. D. Stratton, B. Meakin, and H. C. Page further weakened the team just where it needs strength most - viz. in batting. Vost appeared for the first time this season, J. Poole was included as wicket-keeper, and a trial was given to a new professional in Higgins, a left-hand bowler and right hand bat. As things turned out, the batting broke down badly in both innings against some excellent bowling on a pitch that was never even, but was probably less difficult when Staffordshire batted first than at any other time. So that weak batting was probably the direct cause of the reverse. The side undoubtedly met the young Yorkshiremen at a time when several of their coming men are on the very top of their form, and few minor counties have so fine a pair of bowlers on a soft wicket as Broadbent and Drake have latterly proved themselves to be. The former recently did well against the Australians for Scotland, where he has a professional engagement, and he is included in the Yorkshire team to meet the Colonials shortly. P. Briggs captained the visiting team, and, winning the toss, opened the batting with E. H. Bourne. The Lepton amateur had an experience somewhat strange to him this season, for he was bowled without scoring, and it may be added, that he was unfortunate enough to lose his wicket without getting a run also in the second innings, so that he escaped the dreaded "pail". Three wickets were down for 31, but Hollowood and Vost improved matters to some extent, and so went up without further loss. But this was the only stand of any moment, and the innings was over in about 2 1/2 hours for 118. Hardisty and Turner gave the Yorkshiremen a grand start, and both batters admirably scored 34 before they were separated. Vost was destructive after this, and with Bucknell did so well that seven wickets were down for 133. Then Richardson and Harrison added 40, and the home men eventually took a lead of 61. Staffordshire again found Broadbent and Drake beyond their power to cope with, and the whole side was dismissed in an hour and 40 minutes, leaving Yorkshire 115 only 16 to get for victory. These were obtained without loss, and the Tykes obtained a creditable victory just before two o'clock on Thursday. The following are the scores and analysis:-

J. W. Johnson scored one and was then dismissed by Drake. Hollowood next lost his wicket, after scoring 16 in good style, and seven men were out for 40.

HIGGINS AND MEE SAVE INNINGS DEFEAT.

Bucknell, who was playing carefully, lost the company of J. Poole when the score was 41, and two runs later the Smethwick professional was brilliantly caught with the right hand by Oldroyd at short leg. Higgins when joined by Mee turned Broadbent to leg for two and four. Mee then drove Drake for a couple. Gradually the runs crept on, and a pull for two by Higgins made the score 61 and saved the innings defeat.

STAFFORDSHIRE DEFEATED.

Hardisty and Turner went to the crease at half-past one to get the 16 runs required for victory, and before two o'clock the home side had won by ten wickets. Staffordshire lost the match because they did not score so well as they might have done on yesterday's wicket, and the factors of their first reverse were the brilliant work which Broadbent and Drake wrought with the ball.

WAKEFIELD, Thursday.

When play finished yesterday, the home team were in the satisfactory position of being 55 runs ahead with two wickets in hand. For this they were chiefly indebted to the splendid first wicket stand by Hardisty and Turner, who collected 94 by sound and stylish cricket before the former found himself conquered by Vost, who had been the fifth bowler to be put on.

During the concluding stages of the play, an unfortunate occurrence deprived the visitors of the help of Nichols, who, in fielding the ball, was badly hit and had to retire, Hardisty fielding substitute. Some rain fell about nine o'clock this morning, but it was not sufficient to interfere with the resumption of play at 11 o'clock.

Vost had the best analysis with six wickets for 40 runs. He bowled splendidly, and fully earned the success which attended his efforts. For Royton in the Central Lancashire League he has already taken 61 wickets with an average of nine this season, which is a very creditable record.

VISITORS' UNFORTUNATE START.

An unfortunate start was made by the visitors in their second innings, for, after Briggs had played a maiden from Broadbent, the attack was taken up by Drake. There were ducks at the other end, for with Drake's second ball the Fenton amateur was caught at short slip, and again he went back to the pavilion without scoring.

TO-DAY'S CRICKE

YORKSHIRE II. v. STAFFORDSHIRE.

(Second Class Counties Competition.)

WAKEFIELD, Wednesday.

Fresh from their victory over Durham at Harrogate, the Yorkshire second eleven entertained the Staffordshire team at Wakefield, to-day.

Mr. P. Briggs captained the visiting side, in the absence of Mr. Stratton, and he won the toss and decided to bat first on a wicket which was on the soft side. E. H. Bourne went to the crease with him, and Broadbent and Drake opened the bowling.

Only five runs had been scored when, in Broadbent's second over, Bourne lost his wicket to a fine delivery from the medium-paced break bowler. Fereday occupied the vacated crease, and at once got Broadbent away for a single. Then he pulled the other bowler to leg for a couple, and he next cut Broadbent past point for two and hooked him to leg for a like number.

Meanwhile the amateur had six singles to his credit, and he drove Drake, the left-hander, to mid-off for another. A drive towards the pavilion by Briggs sent up the 20 in 25 minutes. With the total at 22, the batsmen had each scored ten. Fereday almost gave Broadbent a return, and then the Stoke man was almost run out, after hesitating during a second run for a leg hit.

AN EASY WICKET.

There had not been any rain at Wakefield since Sunday, and the wicket, though somewhat soft, seemed to play fairly easily. After Fereday had put up a ball dangerously near cover-point, he was very smartly stumped in reaching out to a tempting delivery from Broadbent. Vost, who has been doing very well for Royton in the Central Lancashire League, was the next comer, and he played a maiden over from Broadbent. A lovely shot by Briggs produced a couple, and he subsequently drove Drake again for a single. At 31, Harrison another left-hand bowler, took the ball from Drake. Just afterwards another clever piece of work by Dolphin caused the retirement of Briggs at 34, with a patiently-compiled 20 against his name. Hollowood was responsible for the first boundary stroke of the game with a delightful cut through the slips. Broadbent, who is undoubtedly a coming man, then sent down his fourth maiden out of 12 overs, and Brown came on at the other end in place of Harrison.

The Burslem captain turned Broadbent nicely to the leg fence, and a bye sent up the 50, after play had progressed an hour and five minutes. Vost, who had been very cautious, cut Brown to the rails through the slips after a quiet spell in which a few singles were added. Booth bowled instead of Broadbent, who had delivered 17 overs for 27 runs and three wickets. Hollowood pulled his second ball to square-leg for two. With a single he made his score into 20, which was twice as many as his partner had gathered in. From the last ball of a second successive maiden over from Brown, Vost neatly played on, he just saving the ball from going into his sticks at the second attempt. He almost chopped the ball into his stumps in the same man's next over, but he then drove him straight for three. A single to Hollowood caused 70 to be hoisted on the board, at the end of an hour and forty minutes play.

Runs now began to come at a quicker rate, and both batsmen did some nice cutting. Drake joined the attack again at 79 in place of Brown, whose eleven overs had cost him 17, and from the first ball of the new bowler's initial series, Hollowood was caught at mid-on, after having been at the crease a little short of an hour. Vost had then made 18. Broadbent took the next over after Nichols came in, and thus the original bowlers were at work again. Drake's second over brought about the dismissal of Vost, who had collected a useful 21. When lunch was taken the score was 84 for five.

DRAKE BOWLS WELL.

The same bowlers as were attacking when the adjournment was made served out the ball upon the resumption, and Drake, whose two maiden overs immediately before lunch had brought him two wickets, sent down another maiden, and was then hit for two and four by the young Oldfields amateur. A fine stoppage by Tattersall at point from Nichols was warmly applauded. Then the professional played Drake twice to leg for two each time, before Johnson played on to Broadbent with

the score at 98. Four bres were given away after the arrival of Bucknell, and they sent up the hundred when the innings had lasted two hours and twenty minutes. Bucknell drove Drake nicely for a couple, but he was caught and bowled by Broadbent when he had contributed seven to the score.

With the score advanced to 116, Nichols misjudged a ball from Drake, and was bowled, and Higgins, who was making his debut with the team, came in. The new-comer, who bats wright hand and bowls left hand, was only able to snatch a single when he was cleverly taken at short leg, and the ninth wicket fell at 118. Without addition Poole got in front of the ball and was out leg before to Broadbent, and so the side were all out at three o'clock, the innings having lasted two hours and

BROADBENT DISTINGUISHES HIMSELF.

Broadbent and Drake, who both bowled excellently, shared the wickets, as they did in both innings against Durham on Monday and Tuesday, when Broadbent took 11 wickets for 45 runs, and Drake had eight for 58. They had very good averages to-day, for Broadbent claimed six wickets for 45, and Drake took four for 33. Broadbent, who is 28 years of age, has distinguished himself on many occasions this season, and only a fortnight ago Mr. Victor Trumper, after having experience of his bowling in the match between Scotland and the Australians, declared that he is one of the most deadly bowlers on a stick wicket he had ever experienced.

YORKSHIRE SECOND ELEVEN v. STAFFORDSHIRE.

BROADBENT AGAIN BOWLS WELL.

Although the wicket was easy, cricket was slow at Wakefield yesterday, a full day's play in the match between the Yorkshire Second Eleven and Staffordshire only realising 291 runs. That was due in part to the excellence of the bowling on both sides. All the same there were two fine batting displays by Turner (66) and Hardisty (49), and they share with Broadbent and Drake the credit of placing Yorkshire in a very satisfactory position at the close of the first day's play. The home county have a lead of 66 runs on the first innings, with two wickets in hand, and if, with that lead, they press home their advantage to-day they will become strong candidates for the top place in the northern division of the Minor Counties Championship Tournament. Staffordshire at present are leaders of the group, but a win for Yorkshire to-day would more nearly equalise the position of the two teams.

Staffordshire no doubt suffered yesterday from the absence of their chief bowler, Barnes, who has invariably performed successfully against the Yorkshire Second Eleven. Yesterday the hon. was on the other leg. Staffordshire found Yorkshire well served by Broadbent and Drake, who again bowled so effectively that they dismissed the visitors for 118 runs. The wicket was decidedly an easy one when Staffordshire commenced to bat on winning the toss, but Broadbent made the ball come off the pitch in such disconcerting fashion that he got the wickets of their three most reliable batsmen—Mr. Briggs, Mr. Bourne, and Fereday—in three-quarters of an hour for 84 runs. It is only fair to add, however, that the downfall of Mr. Briggs' and Fereday's wickets was in part due to the exceedingly smart stumping of Dolphin, the wicket-keeper. For the fourth wicket a useful stand was made by Vost and Hollowood, who occasioned change in the attack. Harrison, Brown, and Booth all failed to dislodge them, but on Broadbent and Drake resuming the latter got Hollowood caught at "silly" mid on for 27, when the partnership had added 45 runs. In his next over Drake, with a ball which broke from the leg, clean bowled Vost for 21, his dismissal making five wickets down for 82. Broadbent and Drake bowled unchanged for the remainder of the innings, and after batting two hours and three-quarters Staffordshire were all out for 118. Except for the period when Vost and Hollowood were together, Broadbent and Drake were always masters of the situation, and, as their analysis shows, the former took six wickets for 45 runs, and the latter four for 33.

Yorkshire, in their reply, began well with Hardisty and Turner, though they found it expedient to treat the bowling of Bucknell and Nicholls with great respect. Runs came very slowly at first, forty minutes being occupied in scoring the first 20. With the changing of the bowling, the batsmen played with greater confidence, and sent up the fifty in exactly the same number of minutes. Hardisty made some very stylish on drives to the boundary, but when one run short of his fifty he had the misfortune to be bowled by the first ball delivered by Vost, who had taken up the attack vice Mee. The Leeds man had been at the wickets for an hour and twenty minutes without giving a chance, and when he left 94 runs were on the score-board. A partial collapse followed, Drake, Booth, and Oldroyd being dismissed for the addition of only nine runs. Turner completed his fifty in an hour and three-quarters, and in partnership with Richardson the Staffordshire total was passed after the innings had been in progress two hours. At 120, Turner was clean bowled by Bucknell. His had been a fine innings, his contribution of 66 being entirely without blemish. Mr. Tattersall and Broadbent followed in quick succession, the latter being caught at long off by Hardisty, who was fielding as a substitute for Nicholls. Nicholls had just previously strained himself in stooping sharply to field the ball. Richardson, who had gone in at the fall of the fourth wicket, contributed a useful innings of 26, and with his dismissal stumpers were drawn, the score then standing at 173 for eight wickets. YORKSHIRE SECOND ELEVEN v. STAFFORDSHIRE.

MIDLAND COUNTY'S FIRST DEFEAT.

By beating Staffordshire in the match at Wakefield yesterday, the Yorkshire Second Eleven accomplished a notable performance. The Midland team had not previously suffered defeat since Durham beat them at Sunderland last summer, and in their engagements in the Minor Counties' Tournament this season they had in every match obtained the full quota of points. Their downfall in the match at Wakefield was primarily due to their weak batting display on Wednesday, when, on an easy wicket, they suffered themselves to be dismissed by Broadbent and Drake for the moderate total, in the circumstances, of 118 runs. Yesterday everything was against them. They had to face a deficit on the first innings of 61 runs, and when they went in to bat a second time the wicket played so queerly that they could only compile a total of 78. Left with only 16 runs to get to win, the Yorkshire colts accomplished their task without loss, and so gained a handsome victory by ten wickets—a result which brings the Yorkshire Second Eleven within measurable distance of the top place in the Northern Division of the Minor Counties' Tournament.

The two wickets which Yorkshire had in hand on the resumption of play yesterday morning fell for six runs in ten minutes, but the lead of 61 runs which had then been obtained was sufficient to place them in a winning position. There had been a heavy shower of rain in the early morning, and when Staffordshire had to take their second innings on a rapidly drying wicket they were at a decided disadvantage. Broadbent, of course, was in his element on such a wicket, and wrought dire destruction upon the opposing side. He chiefly relied upon an off-break ball, with which this week he has been so remarkably successful, though an occasional leg-break which he bowled proved very disconcerting to the batsmen. Drake, the left arm bowler, did not turn the ball to quite the same extent, though he, too, met with considerable success, taking four wickets at a cost of 37 runs, to Broadbent's five for 32. The great part which Broadbent played in bringing about Yorkshire's triumph may be gauged from the fact that he captured eleven wickets in all at a cost of no more than seven runs a piece. In the circumstances, it is not surprising that he is to be included in the Yorkshire team to oppose the Australians at Sheffield next week.

In Staffordshire's second innings, Drake got the first two wickets—those of Mr. Briggs and Mr. Bourne—and as Broadbent immediately followed on by clean bowling Fereday, Vost, and Nicholls, three were five wickets down for 30 runs. Mr. Johnson was bowled by Drake in the next over, and Hollowood, after an attempt to play the forcing game, was clean bowled by Broadbent for 16. The procession continued right up to the fall of the ninth wicket. Mee and Higgins then came together at 43, requiring to get 18 runs to save an innings defeat. This they succeeded in doing, and had, indeed, placed 18 runs to the credit of the side when Harrison went on to bowl, vice Drake, and ended the innings in his first over. The innings had lasted an hour and forty minutes, and a quarter of an hour's batting in Yorkshire's second innings sufficed to enable Hardisty and Turner to rub off the necessary runs. There had been a heavy shower early on the morning of the second day and when Staffordshire batted again on a rapidly drying pitch their batsmen were at a considerable disadvantage. During the Yorkshire first innings Nichols was badly hit by the ball while fielding and had to leave the field. Hardisty acted as substitute fielder and caught Broadbent. Original reports had Nichols bowled Drake in the Staffordshire first innings, but this was subsequently corrected to hit wicket. S F Barnes was away playing in the Gentlemen v Players match at Lord's.
