NORFOLK v. SUFFOLK.

This match opened on the Lakenham Ground, Norwich, on Monday, in breezy, and in the main, bright weather. Both sides were fairly well represented, although the absence of P. W. Cobbold meant a serious loss to Suffolk.

At the end of a completed innings by either side, Suffolk, by a rank bad batting display, and by a missed catch which ought to have disposed of Geoffrey Stevens, when he had made 50, found themselves in arrears. On paper, Suffolk had a tolerably good batting side out, but, apart from H. L. Wilson and C. W. Alexander, they gave a miserable exhibition, which would have disgraced a moderate club team. Admitting that Gibson, the Suffolk pro, bowled steadily and well, there was no excuse for the ordinary batting out with the shots they did. Norfolk were extremely surprised in getting out their opponents for so poor a total as 121, but it so happened that at one time the homesters looked like getting out for even less. They had half their wickets down, or 25, and about a dozen later G. A. Stevens offered a fairly simple catch to Dr. Leeming at third man. The Ipswichian averred that the ball came in line with some trees on the far side, so that he completely lost sight of it till it was just upon him. The bats was serious, for Stevens went on to make another before Trudgett bowled him. The latter was in good form in spite of the fact that he had to trundle against a stiffish wind. He was hardly utilized sufficiently, as he only bowled 15 overs out of 44, and yet disposed of half the side for 59. But for Stevens's fine effort, and a "braver" 72 by the Rev. F. N. Meyrick Jones, who played for Cambridge 21 years back, and who was making his debut for Norfolk, none of the others showed any real good form with the bat.

When Suffolk went in a second time with an hour to go and 61 runs behind, C. W. Alexander and V. F. Gaby played doggedly. The latter left just before the 91 runs had been hit off, and soon a few well-aimed Alexander's meritorious innings came to an end. F. Gaby failed to do himself justice, and when stumps were drawn Suffolk were 22 ahead, with three wickets lost.

The visitors, winning the toss, made a wretched start to the bowling of Gibson and Smith. J. F. Ireland failed in bringing off his favourite pull shot, and was caught at mid-on at 15, whilst 94 later Dr. Leeming was held at cover. H. L. Wilson made two superb cuts to the boundary off Smith in one over which brought on Allsopp at 50, and Wilson got him high over slips heads for 4 in the same over. Allsopp brilliantly stopped a hard drive, and split the thumb of his bowling hand, causing his temporary retirement, with the result that Lord bowled at Wilson hit 7 off his first over. At 41 Stevens, the Lynn pro., relieved Gibson, the latter changing ends, and in a shower of rain Cozens-Hardy brought off another smart catch, which disposed of Wilson, who had knocked up 35 of 44, hitting six 4's. The players then sheltered for a quarter of an hour. V. F. Gaby was missed by Gibson in the slips, but the let off netted not Stevens bowling him with a slower one than usual the same over. This was at 49. C. W. Alexander and Quaife improved matters somewhat, but the pro. left at 82, making half the side out. Allsopp went on again, and caught and bowled Capt. Murray before he had scored, whilst Gibson disposed of Penfold in a similar manner two later. V. F. Gaby stayed with Alexander until the luncheon interval.

On resuming Alexander sent up the 100 with a steady boundary shot, and Gaby, after hitting both bowlers to the boundary, was caught in the long field at 112. Alexander might have been out four later, the Lynn Stevens dropping him at mid-on, but Henley only made a couple before being caught at third man. Trudgett failed completely, and the side were out for 121, Alexander carrying out his bat for 44. Gibson had a fine analysis seven for 50.

Norfolk sent in the Rev. Meyrick Jones and Norman Stevens, who were opposed to Penfold and J. F. Ireland. The clergyman smacked the first named for 13 in his first over, and then Penfold had Stevens caught behind the wickets for a single. Ireland's second over cost 10, and Trudgett went on. After making 52 of 55 in twenty minutes, and hitting seven 4's, Jones was bowled by Penfold, who two later sent back H. Cozens-Hardy. Trudgett caught and bowled Wilson at 38, but Geoffrey Stevens and Allsopp put on 10 before the latter left.

Stevens had made some nice shots off both bowlers, and practically monopolised the scoring, whilst Allsopp was mainly content to sit on the handle of his bat. The first named had helped himself to 50 of the best, when Gaby, determined to close his innings, but though the ball went well to hand, it was dropped. Stevens is a player who does not give many chances at any time, and it so happened that he did not give another, and after Lurgan left with his namesake (the Lynn pro.), placed his side in a much more favourable position. At 92 H. C. Henley bowled in place of Trudgett, and the century was recorded in his second over. Stevens, the professional, who had been hitting very hard, was caught at 100 by the wicket-keeper standing well back. Gibson came in, and was missed in the slips by Captain Murray before he had scored. This proved another serious mistake, as Gibson stayed in a long time after this. Although he only made 11 before he was dismissed by a well judged catch by Alexander, Ireland, who had gone on again, chained this wicket. V. F. Gaby went on, and Stevens hit his first three deliveries for a dozen. That was sufficient to knock the stuffing out of any bowler, and after two overs of his had reached 19, Trudgett went on again, and had the satisfaction of bowling Stevens, who, apart from the batting chance referred to, had played brilliantly for an hour and fifty-three minutes, his 83 including no fewer than fifteen 4's. With his departure the innings was soon over, the total being 121.

Suffolk started their second innings at half past five of in arrears. C. W. Alexander and V. J. Lewis were the first pair, and Gibson and Allsopp bowled. Both played nicely, scoring freely all round the wicket, so that at 52 a bowling change was made, Smith relieving Gibson, whilst Stevens bunched at the other end. Fifty was recorded under the half hour. Alexander especially had shown great enterprise, and had totalled 54 to Lewis's 16 when the latter was yanked by Stevens when the score was 50. Quaife went in, but one later a very heavy shower sent the players into shelter. When they went out again, after about five minutes delay, a three to Quaife and a couple

to Alexander enabled Suffolk to get her nose in front. This was not bad, considering that only one wicket had been out in the effort. There was about twenty minutes to go, but during that time Suffolk lost two more wickets. Alexander, who played capitally both innings, and V. F. Gaby leaving before stumps were drawn for the day, with the score 83 for three.

DECISIVE NORFOLK VICTORY.

Contrary to expectations, this match was concluded at Norwich on Tuesday shortly after half past one. It was lucky for Norfolk that it was so, for had it been necessary to continue after lunch the game would have had to have been abandoned owing to rain. Suffolk fought hard in the last hour or so on Monday night to wipe off arrears, and did well till a quarter of an hour before drawing stumps, when three wickets fell quickly. They were 21 runs to the good then, and Quaife and Dr. Leeming started so confidently on Tuesday morning that at one time the side were in quite a good position. The score board registered 110 for three, but the home captain (B. K. Wilson) hit upon the happy expedient of putting on Stevens, the Lynn professional, and from that time there was quite a collapse, for a few were out for 119, the remaining six could only aggregate forty. Dr. Leeming's dismissal was quickly followed by Quaife's, who was beaten by an exceptionally good ball from Smith, which pitched outside the off stump and took the middle. Quaife had been in fifty-five minutes in making his 29, and other good hits were to follow everybody naturally expected that Norfolk would be set a decent total to win, but nobody with the exception of J. F. Ireland came up to expectations, and his 33 was by no means a perfect compilation, and the homesters went in at a quarter before one with only 99 runs to get. And they got them in fifty minutes! The Rev. N. F. Meyrick-Jones improved on his first innings display, and banged the ball all over the field; he hit terrifically hard, and never gave the slightest chance, and mainly through his efforts 50 was registered, in less than half the number of minutes. Trudgett gained applause for catching N. Stevens from a hard drive, but the match was as good as won then, only 37 being required. Jones, however, was down, and Geoffrey Stevens made 30 of the remainder. Overnight Suffolk had wiped off the first innings arrears, and were 24 on with three out. Allsopp and Smith started, but the latter gave way to Gibson after an over. The batsmen played steadily, and the hundred was recorded without further loss. Stevens bowled in Allsopp's place at 119, and with his first delivery had Dr. Leeming out leg before, whilst in the next over Smith, who had relieved Gibson, bowled Quaife (middle stump). Ireland was not comfortable with Stevens, but he remained longer than his captain, who had his leg stumped razed by the pro. just managed to break his duck before Smith bowled him. Ireland had luck when Geoffrey Stevens dropped him fielding third man. Stevens, the professional, also missed him at mid-on, Gibson, but in the same over Cozens-Hardy caught him at cover; this was at 156. After Penfold had driven Stevens for 3, Henley played on to the same bowler without scoring, and Trudgett being out Norfolk required 99 to win, and Meyrick-Jones set about the bowling in fine style. He made some audacious pulls to start with, but later got in brilliant off shots. Penfold might have caught Norman Stevens at 80, but failed. Henley went

on, but the 50 appeared in 24 minutes. At 62 Trudgett caught and bowled Stevens from a hard drive. Geoffrey Stevens came in, and with Jones hit off the required number, Norfolk winning easily by nine wickets.

GOOD BOWLING BY STEVENS.

FINE BATTING LEADS TO NORFOLK VICTORY.

Some capital bowling by Stevens, the Lynn Grammar School professional, and some bright and forceful batting by the Rev. F. Meyrick-Jones and the brothers Norman and Geoffrey Stevens, enabled Norfolk to win their first match of the season by defeating Suffolk at Lakenham yesterday by the substantial margin of nine wickets. When play ceased on Monday Suffolk, with three wickets down in their second innings, were 22 runs on. Yesterday morning Stevens and Smith bowled so well that the seven remaining wickets were captured in less than an hour for the addition of 76 runs. Of this number, Dr. Leeming and Quaife contributed 36 before they were parted, but after Stevens had dismissed the doctor with his first ball only J. F. Ireland gave much trouble, and the latter was lucky with more than one of his hits. Yesterday Stevens dismissed four batsmen for 28 runs, and his figures for the complete innings were six for 56, which is so far his best bowling performance for the county. Norfolk required 69 runs to win, and, as in the first innings, Meyrick-Jones went for the bowling in determined fashion. He made one or two audacious pulls and a number of fine drives. He also cut well, and with the brothers Stevens also in an aggressive mood the runs were knocked off in three-quarters of an hour, the match being finished before the players took lunch. It was a brilliant finish to a good match, and, as the rain shortly afterwards set in for the rest of the day, Norfolk could congratulate themselves upon having made the most of their opportunity. It was Suffolk's first defeat of the season. Now that Norfolk has turned the corner it is to be hoped that further successes will be gained in the remaining matches, of which three will be played at Norwich next

week against Herts, Lincolnshire, and Bedfordshire, one at Lynn on August 9th and 10th with Cambridgeshire, and the last at Lincoln on August 11th and 12th. Suffolk, who had lost three wickets overnight in wiping off the first innings' arrears and obtaining a lead of 22, went on with their second innings yesterday morning in warm sunshine. The wind was less in evidence than on the previous day, but rain clouds still hovered around. Quaife and Dr. Leeming were the not outs, the professional having been at the wickets twenty-seven minutes on Monday afternoon for a dozen runs. Smith led the attack from the top end, but after one over, in which the doctor scored 4 through the slips, he was displaced by Gibson. Allsopp operated from the other end, and both batsmen made scoring strokes off him on the leg side. Quaife was beaten by a ball from Gibson, which went for 4 byes, but he subsequently turned several balls deftly to leg, and made a beautiful boundary stroke to the left of mid-off. The score had been taken from 89 to 119, when Stevens, going on for Allsopp, got the doctor leg before to his first delivery. The fourth wicket had added a useful 36 in twenty-five minutes, and after J. F. Ireland had scored 6 runs by his on stroke and a pretty cut, another change of bowling brought Norfolk a good fifth wicket, Smith re-appearing at the top end to bowl Quaife middle stump with his fifth ball. Quaife was batting altogether the better part of an hour, and scored 29 out of 69. With half their wickets gone Suffolk were 64 runs on, and Ireland and H. L. Wilson were now together. Several balls from Smith rose sharply, and in a disconcerting manner from the pitch, but Ireland drove Stevens straight for 3, and made a pretty late cut off Smith. Shortly afterwards Stevens rendered his side signal service by sending Wilson's leg stump flying, and with the addition of a single run Smith bowled Captain Murray off his pad, the seventh wicket falling at 133. Ireland made a splendid straight drive off Stevens soon after the arrival of Penfold, but in the same over the Cantab attempted a drive, and skied the ball in the direction of third man, where G. A. Stevens failed to make the catch. Ireland increased his score by three beautiful shots to fine leg, and with Gibson taking the ball from Smith at 156 the Cantab gave a hot chance to Stevens at mid-on, but in the same over he put up a ball on the other side of the wicket, and was caught by Cozens-Hardy. Going in at the fall of the fourth wicket at 119 Ireland was eighth out at 156, having scored 38 out of 87 in forty

minutes. Ireland hit five 4s and two 3s. Three runs later the last two wickets fell to successive balls from Stevens. H. C. Henley playing on, and Trudgett being very cleverly caught at slip by Gibson. The innings closed at half-past twelve for 159, having lasted altogether 123 minutes, seven wickets falling yesterday in seventy-three minutes for the addition of 76 runs. Capturing four wickets yesterday for 28 runs, Stevens' complete record for the innings was six wickets for 56, an extremely creditable performance. In his second spell of bowling, Smith took two wickets for 8 runs. Wanting 99 to win Norfolk entered upon their task at 13 minutes to one with the Rev. F. Meyrick-Jones and N. W. Stevens. Penfold commenced bowling from the pavilion end, and Jones scored 2 for a pull shot, and 4 for a fine stroke between cover and point in the first over, whilst Stevens opened with a 2 to leg and a square cut to the boundary from Trudgett's first two balls. Jones scored two 4s in Penfold's next over, the first a pull to the left of square leg, and the other a straight drive. Stevens then played a maiden over from Trudgett, but the clergyman helped the score along rapidly, driving Penfold and cutting Trudgett. With three men placed on the boundary, Jones had to be content with singles for some big hits, but Stevens, after a life at slip off Trudgett, lifted the bowler to the on seats. Henley came on to bowl for Penfold at 40, and Jones lifted his first ball past the screen, Dr. Leeming falling over the seat in attempting to reach the ball. Fifty of the required runs were obtained in twenty-four minutes, and in Henley's second over, Jones made a grand off drive to the seats. The pair had scored 62 in half an hour when Stevens was brilliantly caught and bowled off a hot return to Trudgett. Geoffrey Stevens came in, and Jones registered another boundary drive off Trudgett. Stevens gave a possible chance behind the wicket off Trudgett, and then scored four for a hit to long leg. Penfold came on again at 80, and bowled a maiden over to Jones, but with two admirable cuts from Stevens Norfolk crept nearer to victory. Stevens hit Penfold round for 4, and a nick to leg off Trudgett made the game a tie. The pleasure of making the winning hit was reserved for Jones, who hit the first ball of Penfold's eighth over past cover point, and at 28 minutes to 2 Norfolk had won their first match of the season by 9 wickets. The freedom of the Norfolk batting may be judged from the fact that 102 runs were scored off twenty overs in 47 minutes. Jones' share was 48, and he hit eight 4s and one 3. Geoffrey Stevens hit five 4s in his 30.

NORFOLK v. SUFFOLK.

AN INTERESTING DAY'S PLAY.

GEOFFREY STEVENS IN FORM.

The Norfolk eleven made their first appearance at Lakenham this season yesterday, the match being the return fixture with Suffolk, and as the result of a very interesting day's play the game is now in a fairly even state. The weather was rather unsettled, and sharp showers caused two very brief interruptions, but by a few minutes after five o'clock each side had completed a first innings, Norfolk having established a lead of 61 runs. In the final hour's play Suffolk scored 83 runs for the loss of three wickets, so that the visitors are now 22 runs on with seven wickets in hand. C. W. Alexander, who gave two admirable displays, was dismissed shortly after a shower of rain had fallen at six o'clock, but Suffolk have some excellent batsmen left, and one may doubt whether J. F. Ireland, Quaife, Dr. Leeming, and Captain Murray will be got rid of so cheaply as they were yesterday morning, and H. L. Wilson, who has been scoring heavily of late, is still to go in. If Gibson, who bowled effectively yesterday, or any of the four Norfolk professional bowlers, of whom only Smith is right-handed, meet with any success this morning the way should be clear for a Norfolk victory. Yesterday the batting was confined to a select few. Geoffrey Stevens gave the Suffolk bowlers another sample of his skill. He was batting nearly two hours, and scored only 6 runs less than he made against Suffolk at Woodbridge on June 21st. He was at the wicket throughout the greater part of the Norfolk innings, going in when only 16 runs had been scored, and only 9 runs being added after he left. He was lucky in being missed when he had made 30, but apart from that stroke he gave a delightful display. The Rev. F. Meyrick-Jones played a Jessop-like first innings for Norfolk. He has had previous experience of important cricket with Cambridge University, Kent, and Hampshire, and yesterday he sent the ball to the boundary with an ease and frequency which made everyone regret that his stay at the wickets was not longer. In twenty minutes he scored 32 out of 35, and gave the side a encouraging start. A number of clever catches were made yesterday, and the fielding, as a whole, was good.

Quaife missed the train, and H. L. Wilson, who won the toss for the neighbouring county, took J. F. Ireland in with him to open the Suffolk innings at a quarter to twelve. It was the Cambridge University player's first appearance for Suffolk since his long innings of 221 at Newmarket last August. Gibson began the attack from the pavilion end, the wind blowing straight across the ground. Smith bowled from the opposite wicket, and with only 13 runs scored Ireland was well caught at mid on by Norman Stevens off a ball from Smith which he attempted to pull. Ireland's only scoring stroke was a 3 pull between short leg, and mid-on—his favourite shot—and Norfolk were fortunate to get rid of the Cantab so cheaply. Seven runs later Dr. Leeming was well caught at extra cover, Cozens-Hardy taking the ball very close to the ground. V. J. Lewis joined his captain, who made some forceful strokes in front of the wicket, and at 30 Allsopp took the ball from Smith. In stopping a hot return from Wilson, the Norwich City footballer damaged the thumb of his bowling hand. He finished the over, and then retired for a few minutes to have some strapping applied to the injured spot. In his absence Lord bowled an over, but could not get a length, and Gibson crossed to the top end, where the wind was more likely to help his swerve. Stevens took up the bowling at the pavilion end at 41, and shortly afterwards the fielding side secured another wicket, Wilson being out to a fine catch by Cozens-Hardy, who ran from extra cover and took the ball sideways and several yards from behind mid-off. Wilson hit six 4s during a stay of fifty minutes and scored 35 out of 48. A shower of rain delayed the game for nearly a quarter of an hour, and on resuming Lewis was accompanied by C. W. Alexander. With one run added Lewis was missed at slip, but he was bowled in the same over by the Lynn professional, four wickets thus falling within an hour for 49 runs. Quaife and Alexander improved matters, and after the last named had a narrow escape of being caught at short leg off Stevens, he scored 10 off the Lynn man's next over. Thirty-three runs were added quickly, and then the fifth, sixth, and seventh wickets fell for one run, the batsmen all being out to catches offered to the bowler. It was a smart left handed catch with

which Gibson sent back Quaife, but Captain Murray and Penfold were out to easy returns, Murray's wicket being secured by Allsopp soon after he had relieved Stevens. V. F. Gaby and Alexander survived the few minutes left before luncheon, when the score was 91 for seven wickets, Alexander being not out 29.

After the interval the remaining three wickets were captured by Gibson in a little over a quarter of an hour for the addition of 30 runs. Alexander and Gaby took the score from 91 to 108 when the latter was caught in the long field by Cozens-Hardy, and in his next over Gibson dismissed Henley and Trudgett, the amateur being caught at third man. Alexander took out his bat for an invaluable 44, which had occupied him nearly an hour. Going in at the fall of the third wicket at 48 he was undefeated when the innings closed at 17 minutes to 3 for 121, having lasted 109 minutes. Alexander hit five 4s. Taking his last three wickets in two overs for 3 runs Gibson's final figures were seven for 36, a fine piece of work on a wicket which offered little, if any, help to the bowler, although he was doubtless materially assisted by the wind.

Norfolk went in at 3 o'clock, the Rev. F. Meyrick-Jones and N. W. Stevens opening the innings to the bowling of Penfold and J. F. Ireland. The clergyman started hitting confidently from the outset, making three fine drives in Ireland's first over, but with the score at 16 Stevens was caught behind the wicket off Penfold. His place was taken by his younger brother. A second over from Ireland yielded 10 runs, Jones making another drive, and a pretty late cut. Trudgett relieved the Cantab, and off the new bowler Jones scored a single for an uppish stroke in the slips. Jones next turned his attention to Penfold, driving the first ball over mid off's head to the boundary, and taking another four for a beautiful square cut, but in the same over Penfold had his revenge by bowling the clergyman, who had scored 32 out of 35 in twenty minutes. With the departure of Jones the game went suddenly in favour of the visitors, B. Cozens-Hardy being bowled by Penfold, and the Norfolk captain caught and bowled by Trudgett, so that at the end of half an hour Norfolk had lost four wickets in making 38. Allsopp revived the hopes of the spectators by staying what time Geoffrey Stevens made three beautiful strokes to the off, but Allsopp had only collected four runs in twenty minutes when he was taken at slip, half the side being out for 56. R. W. Thurgar was next associated with his old school fellow, who made a fine off drive and a square leg hit off Penfold, but after shaping well Thurgar came forward to play Trudgett, and was bowled, the sixth wicket going down at 72. Stevens came in and started confidently, driving Trudgett to the boundary three times in the course of two overs. Meanwhile, Geoffrey Stevens, when 20,

had the good fortune to be missed at third man by Gaby off Penfold. With the score at 92 Henley took the ball from Trudgett, and the old Norvicnsian registered a clever four between short leg and mid-on. The 100 was reached at a quarter past four, but six runs later the Lynn professional was caught behind the wicket off the new bowler. A valuable 34 runs had been added in twenty minutes for the seventh wicket, Stevens hitting three 4s in his 17. Rain began to fall as Gibson walked to the wickets, Norfolk still requiring 16 runs to head the visitor's total. Gibson was almost immediately missed at slip by Murray off the fast bowler, whom he subsequently drove between cover and mid-off to the boundary. Then Stevens punished Penfold to the extent of 18 in one over, two boundary strokes to the off and a fine leg hit, completing his 50 out of 108 in eighty-three minutes, the Suffolk total being passed at half-past four with three wickets in hand. Gaby, a medium pace left hand bowler was introduced into the attack at the pavilion end, and Stevens helped himself to three fourers in his first over. Ireland was more successful in relieving Penfold, as in his second over Gibson skied a ball on the off side, and was well taken by Alexander. The eighth wicket had put on 46 in twenty-five minutes, Gibson's share being a useful 11. E. Lord opened with a rather lucky 3 through the slips, but he gathered confidence from the easy and masterful batting of his partner, and remained to the end, without, however, making any further addition to the score. Geoffrey Stevens' long innings came to a close through an attempt to hit a ball from Trudgett which curled in the air, passed the bat, and hit the wicket. Going in at the fall of the first wicket at 16, Stevens was ninth out at 173, scoring 83 runs in seven minutes under two hours, and hitting fifteen 4s, two 3s, and three 2s. It was a fine effort, the variety and power of his strokes being delightful to watch, and his only bad stroke was the catch to third man when his score was 30. Smith smacked two fourers, and was then caught at point, the innings closing at six minutes past five for 152, the runs having been made in 126 minutes. Trudgett, with five wickets for 39, secured a better analysis than Penfold, whose three wickets cost him nearly 20 apiece.

In arrears of 61, Suffolk commenced their second innings shortly before half-past five. Alexander, who had Lewis for a partner, played easily and freely, and mainly through his efforts all but 5 of the deficiency had been wiped out when Stevens, going on as second change, got rid of Lewis, the batsman chopping at an over-pitched ball to the off and edging it into his wicket. Soon after the advent of Quaife a smart shower caused a delay of six minutes, and, resuming again at five minutes past six, Norfolk captured two wickets before the close of play, Alexander being cleverly taken at slip by Allsopp, and Gaby sent back by Cozens-Hardy's fourth catch of the day, the ball being hit hard and head high in the direction of mid-off. Alexander's second valuable contribution was 43, and he hit six 4s during a forty minutes' stay. Dr. Leeming and Quaife were together when stumps were drawn with the score at 83 for three.
