CRICKET.

Suffolk experienced a disastrous week against Norfolk and Cambridgeshire, and with only eight points out of a possible 35, they now take a lowly place in the Divisional table.

Suffolk's side against Norfolk was a fairly good one, although there were some well-known names missing, such as Capt. Wilson, P. W. Cobbold, K. Raynor, F. H. Mustard.

For a time Suffolk retrieved their reputation, for they got to within five of Norfolk, with only one wicket down. When they resumed on the second day they were 21 to the good with three out.

Suffolk's display against Cambridgeshire was even worse, and they were defeated by an innings and 77 runs. But for A. F. Ling and Watte, Cambs would have opened with a very moderate score, and it would have been under 200 had the chances of getting rid of the two named been accepted.

In response to this big score, all Suffolk could do was to score 96, and of this total Capt. Murray obtained 55 without being defeated. Most of the others threw away their wickets by wretched strokes; four of them allowed L. J. Reid to get them out with donkey-drops.

Colchester and East Essex were distinctly unfortunate in the weather, two matches being spoilt by rain. This was in contrast to last year, when brilliant weather prevailed throughout, and every match was able to be played out.

The wicket was terribly soft, but the Rev. A. J. Fenn bowled splendidly, and was mainly instrumental in getting rid of the visitors so cheaply. For Colchester, Miles Townsend, D. Mustard, and Allen all shaped stylishly with the bat, and the efforts of this trio were such that Chelmsford were beaten after the fall of the third wicket.

The match between Framlingham College Masters and Mr. Hill Wood's XI, which saw the opening of the Masters' week on the College ground, proved an exciting finish. The wicket was rendered more difficult after the overnight rain, by a drying wind, and, therefore, tall scoring was hardly expected.

Cambs. played their first home match of the season on Wednesday and Thursday, meeting Suffolk on Fenner's in the Minor Counties' Championship. The home team were as strong as they possibly could be, but Suffolk were hardly at full strength. Winning the toss, Cambs. opened the batting with L. J. Reid and Coulson, the bowling being shared by Bassett and Trudgett. With only a couple to his name, and the total standing at eight, Coulson had a narrow escape, but Quaife failed to take advantage of the difficult chance given him. Coulson managed to run his score up to eleven, and then came down through a smart ball from Bassett.

A. S. Ling partnered L. J. Reid, but before any addition was made to the score a very smart catch by Trudgett dismissed Reid. With A. S. Ling and C. H. Pigg together, the scoring became more rapid, Pigg on one occasion driving three four's in succession. When he had but 23 to his credit, Ling had a narrow escape from being stumped, but he managed to jump within the crease before the ball was gathered. A change of bowling was tried, H. C. Henley relieving Trudgett. His fourth ball proved effective, O. H. Pigg tamely returning the ball to from whence it came. H. C. Tebbutt, who followed, had a short stay, being out lbw for a "duck."

B. W. Pigg and A. S. Ling now began to make things more lively, and the run was quickly registered. B. W. Pigg played particularly well, and during the half hour he was at the wicket, he made 46, and hit seven 4's. Watts, who is now playing at his best, joined Ling, and at luncheon these two were still together, the score standing at 157 for five wickets.

On the resumption of play, both Ling and Watts hit out with splendid judgment, and it was soon evident that they were going to run up a fine score between them. One hundred and forty runs were put on in an hour. For over three hours Ling batted, and when he was captured he had 136 to his name, having hit 16 fours, five threes, and fifteen two's. Watts carried his score to 83 before he was caught by Wilson. The tail men added very few, and the innings closed for 372.

Suffolk opened their first innings with C. W. Alexander and Quaife, who were opposed to Coulson and B. W. Pigg. The old Warwickshire man got Coulson prettily to leg for three, and Alexander made some nice off shots, but the score was only 14 when the first-named was adjudged leg before to the pro. In trying to get Pigg to leg, Alexander skied the leather, and Rose, running from mid-on, caught him. Captain Murray came in, and got Coulson to square leg for 4, and slipped him for three. It was touch and go with Captain Wilson, who essayed the third run, for B. W. Pigg, who ran for the ball, threw down the wickets, just as the Captain's bat slid over the crease. Murray straight drove Pigg beautifully for four, all run. At 50 L. J. Reid bowled in place of Pigg, and every ball of his second over yielded a run. Captain Wilson, who shaped as if he was going to make a lot of runs, was bowled by Coulson at 61.

Reid's googlies nearly had the effect of disposing of F. H. Mustard for a duck, but the Cambridge captain failed to hold a one-handed catch at short leg. The Suffolk skipper had only made a couple when he stepped well out of his crease, missed a donkey drop, and was easily stumped. It was a pity he did not exercise a little more restraint so early in the innings. Vernon Lewis was all at sea with the slow bowler, and was stumped without scoring, making half the side out. H. Bassett was out the same over, caught and bowled, and the score was still 74.

Murray got Coulson through the slips for a couple, and then S. G. Bennett was bowled by Reid, who was meeting with extraordinary success. The next wicket fell to Coulson, who clean bowled H. C. Henley at 81. P. P. Cornell came in to take the last over or so before drawing stumps, and succeeded in keeping his end up.

Play had only been in progress for twenty minutes on Thursday, when the Suffolk innings was brought to a conclusion for 92. Captain Murray played magnificent cricket for his 55 not out. Suffolk now required 277 to save the innings defeat, and soon after half past eleven they started on their almost hopeless task. Although the players put much more heart into the game in the second innings they were unable to stand against the bowling of Coulson and B. W. Pigg, and the innings terminated for 199, thus giving the home team a handsome victory.

FINE INNINGS BY LING AND WATTS.

As strong a team as Cambs. can turn out commenced the first home match of the season at Fenner's this morning against Suffolk, who brought but a moderate eleven. Long continued rain had made the wicket originally prepared so soft that at the last moment a change was made, and upon a pitch which promised to become awkward as the sun exercised a drying effect, Cambs., fortunate in winning the toss, opened their first venture with L. J. Reid and Coulson, to the bowling of Bassett and Trudgett. Very few spectators were upon the ground when the match was commenced.

Quite early Coulson had an escape. He had only made a couple, the total standing at eight, when he squared out Trudgett and gave a very hard chance to Quaife at point which was not accepted. The miss, however, was not very expensive, as when Coulson had just got into double figures he fell to a difficult ball from Bassett. Without any addition to the score Reid was out to a very smart left-handed catch by Trudgett, who was bowling at the orchard end. The first wicket association had realised 33. A. S. Ling and C. H. Pigg then entered upon a profitable partnership. Scoring was brisk in spite of the change of bowling, by which Captain Wilson relieved Bassett when the total stood at 50, and upon one occasion Pigg anote three 4's in succession. Either batsman set about the bowling with a will. Ling had a slice of luck when he had collected 23. He came out at one from Wilson, and ought to have been stumped, but was back within the crease before the ball was gathered. Up to the second change in the bowling things were going very cheerily for the home team. At 58 Trudgett gave place to H. C. Henley, who in a couple of overs materially altered the outlook. His fourth ball was returned somewhat lamely by Pigg, who was out c. and b. for 26, and H. C. Tebbutt, after having escaped a Yorker, retired for obstruction to the same bowler. The previous state of the game was two wickets for 88; now it was four for 88. With B. W. Pigg associated with Ling, the hundred was signalled after play had been in progress an hour and 20 minutes. B. W. Pigg played a very attractive game of half-an-hour's duration. His driving was beautifully timed, and having most of the bowling he soon overhauled his partner. They were level all at 40, and then Pigg went ahead. He looked like going on for a long while when he returned a ball to Trudgett. During the half-hour he scored 49 out of the 64 the wicket produced, and hit seven 4's. Watts and Ling were together at the luncheon interval, when Cambs. had scored 157 for the loss of five wickets, Ling being not out 41.

After lunch there was a batting display worthy of a far larger attendance than was to be found upon Fenner's. All bowling came alike to Ling and Watts, who were in fine form, the professional batting in a style which recalled his best days. In an hour the pair put on no less than 140 runs, though it must be admitted it was not done without some luck. Each batsman was given a life, and the mistakes proved very expensive for Suffolk. Off Bassett's first over Watts gave a chance to Lewis at cover point and was let off, and later in his innings Henley might have taken him in the country, but misjudged the flight of the ball. Meanwhile runs were coming at a merry pace. Ling set an example by driving Trudgett for four, two, four, two, and a four in one over, and Watts was not slow to follow. Ling also gave a chance to Bennett at point—and also was let off. Bassett, Trudgett, Mustard, Capt. Wilson, and Henley had turn and turn about with the ball, and still the scoring went on. The 200 was hoisted in 2 hours and 10 minutes, and the 300 rather less than an hour afterwards. In the meantime Ling had reached three figures, and soon afterwards changed his bat. With the bat his luck changed, for in trying to drive Trudgett for another four he skied one to Alexander at mid-on, and was easily caught. He had played magnificent cricket for just over three hours, and his 136 included 16 fours, five threes, and 15 twos. The sixth wicket fell at 331. With the arrival of F. E. Collier Watts was all but run out. A call was made. Watts ran half-way up the pitch, but Collier had apparently not heard the call, and Watts got back just in time to save his wicket. The partnership only added ten runs when Watts was out to a very similar stroke to that which ended Ling's long innings. His stay at the wickets had lasted about an hour and a quarter, during which period he played a characteristic forcing game which yielded 83 runs. He hit eight fours. The eighth and ninth wicket fell cheaply, and the partnership of Collier and the captain having yielded 24, the innings concluded for the substantial total of 372.

Trudgett was the most successful bowler, taking six wickets for 134 runs. H. Bassett took two for 99, and H. C. Henley two for 28.

Upon a wicket which was in better condition than might have been expected, Suffolk commenced with O. W. Alexander and Quaife, who were opposed by Coulson and B. W. Pigg. Very largely, they contented themselves with defensive tactics. Alexander, when he had scored six, touched a rising ball from Pigg and gave a hard chance behind the wicket, which was not taken. Quaife was the first to go, an appeal for l.b.w. being answered in favour of

Coulson, who thus took his first wicket for six runs. The second wicket fell at 20, Rose covering a good deal of ground to catch Alexander off Pigg.

Cambs. v. Suffolk.

CAMBS. WIN HANDSOMELY.

When this match was resumed at Fenner's to-day Cambs. were in an excellent position, for on Wednesday they had made 372, and then got eight Suffolk wickets for 82. Twenty minutes' play this morning sufficed to finish off the innings, which closed for 92. Capt. Murray was the only man to show any confidence, and his 55 not out was absolutely faultless. Reid took four wickets for 22, Coulson three for 27, and Pigg two for 37.

Wanting 277 to save the innings defeat Suffolk followed on soon after half-past 11. Coulson and B. W. Pigg shared the attack, bowling to Capt. Murray and H. Bassett. Both men batted steadily, but with the score at 20, Bassett survived a very confident appeal for a catch behind the wicket. Ten runs later Coulson appealed for l.b.w. against the same man, and was evidently surprised when the appeal was ignored. With no addition to the score, however, Capt. Murray was taken low down at point. With Alexander in Bassett had another narrow shave, a fine shot by Coulson almost throwing him out. After this the score rose steadily, and the half century was hoisted as the result of nearly an hour's play. At 53 Rose went on for Coulson. The change had no immediate effect, and at 75 Pigg gave way to Reid. Runs came as freely as ever, and the 100 was hoisted a few minutes before one. After the fall of the third wicket at 129 a change came over the game. The bowlers regained the upper hand, wickets fell steadily, and the whole side was out just before the 200 was reached. Cambs. thus scored their second win in the Minor Counties' Championship by an innings and 77 runs. Coulson took four wickets for 58, B. W. Pigg five for 64, and G. Rose one for 28.
