SPORTING NOTES.

THURSDAY.

At Lynn on Monday and Tuesday Norfolk exacted a terrible revenge for the defeat which they suffered from Cambs. earlier in the season. At Newmarket in July, Cambs. simply romped over Norfolk, but at Lynn the positions were exactly reversed. Winning the toss gave Norfolk the match, and by way of illustrating the narrow margin between success and failure in cricket, I might mention that the Norfolk captain seriously considered the advisability of putting Cambs. in. If he had done so he could never have lived it down. Again, the second ball G. A. Stevens received swung in from leg, beat him altogether, and skimmed over the off bail, missing it by a coat of paint. For the next two hours and a quarter Stevens played perfect cricket, and his 104 was quite the feature of a brilliant batting display.

The Cambs. collapse after their long and arduous work in the field surprised nobody. The men were very tired when they went in, and Raikes and Gibson bowled particularly well. In the second innings, however, Cambs. made a gallant fight. They failed to avert the innings' defeat, but a score of 211 on a worn pitch and against the Norfolk bowling was a quite creditable performance. The outstanding feature of the innings was the batting of L. J. Reid, and F. Roberson, the Ely captain, whose reappearance in county cricket is very welcome. Reid played very correct cricket for his 57, and his defence was particularly good. He was batting an hour and three-quarters, and was out to a very doubtful decision for stumping. Roberson's batting was quite up to his old form, and he was the only man who could score off Raikes. Time after time he put the old Oxonian away to leg in delightful fashion, and everybody who saw him bat will hope for his continued appearance in the team. The only other batsman who scored many was B. W. Figg, who hit out in lively style for 29. Cambs., by the way, might very well learn a lesson from the masterly handling of the Norfolk bowling. The changes were very cleverly rung on Raikes, who, towards the close, was making the ball turn a great deal. Gibson, a good medium-paced bowler, and Stevens, a useful fast bowler. As a rule the Cambs. bowling is not managed to the best advantage.

The Senior League grows more exciting week by week, and at the present stage nobody can say who will carry off the cup. This is as it should be for everybody prefers a close finish to a runaway victory. At the time of writing St. Giles' are at the head of affairs, but the Rodney, with a match in hand, are only a point behind, and the Albert Institute, with two matches in hand, are only three points away. The first two meet on Saturday, and the result of the match must largely effect the ultimate issue. St. Giles' remaining match is with the "Church," who, on present form, they should beat. The Rodney have to play the Albert and Newmarket, while the Albert have some stiff obstacles to face in the Camden, Newmarket, and the Rodney, and they also have to play the C.E.Y.M.S. Altogether it should be a most sporting finish.

There were sudden changes of fortune in the Rodney-Albert game on Thursday. The Senior League favourites got half the points, but they were lucky to save their bacon. First Albert Institute had 141 on the board with four wickets down, and appeared to have a strong hold on the game, but the remaining batsmen collapsed before the bowling of Stibben and Morgan, the last six wickets adding only 23 runs. Stibben captured 4 wickets for 22. Rodney started confidently to get the hundred and sixty odd runs, but they lost seven wickets for 96 runs. There was still plenty of time, and defeat stared them in the face. Fortunately for them they had two good bats left, Kitchener and Preston, and these stayed in until stumps were drawn at half-past six. Kitchener defended well, and refused to take any risk, but Preston could not resist the temptation to have a go at some of A. Haigh's slow leg-breaks. He gave no chance though. The score was left at 117 for 7 wickets, and an exciting finish should have been seen if the match had been played out. Hunt did best of the Albert bowlers, taking 3 wickets for 34.

The C.E.Y.M.S. again suffered a heavy defeat, the Camden beating them with ridiculous ease. In every department the "Church" were hopelessly inferior to their opponents. Batting first the Camden ran up a score of 236 for 7. All the men scored well, but the chief honours went to S. S. Rowley and F. E. Collier. Collier played good, sound cricket, but from the spectators' point of view Rowley's display was the more interesting. He scored much faster than usual, at one time hitting six 4's in succession. The "Church" never looked like obtaining the runs, and the only excitement came late in the afternoon, when it appeared possible for them to play out time. However, the Camden eventually won with a quarter of an hour to spare. Simpson bowled better than he has previously done this season, taking 4 for 32. P. W. Gray got 4 for 56 and P. A. French 1 for 4.

The Albert picked up a couple of very easy points on Saturday when they annihilated the Crown. From the start the Albert had the match in hand, and they always looked like winning hands down. Thanks largely to F. Walton and S. Woolston, the Crown made 112, but it was obvious that on a perfect pitch and against rather poor bowling, the Albert were not likely to be troubled with this score. They were not. They had just an hour's batting, and in that time they made 193 without losing a wicket. Hunt again claimed the lion's share, making 146, while Bowman got 47. He scored very fast all through, but towards the end his pace was terrific, 20 runs being obtained off one over.

On Saturday St. Giles' added a couple of points to their total by beating Newmarket at Newmarket. The racing metropolis does not seem to be very prolific in cricketers just now, for only four of the team hailed from Newmarket town, and those four only contributed ten runs to the total of 91. Pat Robins (Moulton) made 24 in good style for Newmarket, but his brother Guy was caught when he had scored a couple. W. Hitch (the well-known Cheveley player) was the only other batsman to make a score, but he was very badly missed at long-off half way through his innings. The Newmarket innings closed for 91, which is a small score on such an excellent pitch with close-cropped grass up to easy boundaries. At first it seemed as though St. Giles' were going to bungle their chances, for C. H. Parish, who is a Newmarket resident, engaged in a bank there took three wickets—Wolfe, Richardson and Fromant—in three overs, for only seven runs. Kidman stopped the rot, and carried the score from 18 to 52 but it was Whybro who won the match with a well-played innings of 45. Laurie came in to smite the bowling, but after making a six and a four he missed a straight one, and it was left to Barker to complete the innings. It is remarkable that the best bowling and the best batting of the day was shown by men who were juniors last season—H. Howard, who took five wickets for 16 runs, and R. Whybro, who scored 45 not out.

The town clubs are faring badly in the cup: but it is about time the country clubs had a look in. Another fancied Cambridge team, the Pitt Press, got knocked out on Saturday at Bottisham. Batting first, the Press were all out for 58, the only man to get into double figures being Allen. Three wickets were down for 11, 4 for 36, and 6 for 53. The Pitt Press have a strong batting side, and usually make plenty of runs, so their collapse was a surprise. Their bowling is not particularly strong, and they could scarcely hope to get Bottisham out for less than 58. The villagers knocked off the runs for the loss of five wickets. For the losers Rooke took 3 wickets for 17.

Another town club to go under to a country team was the Railway United, who were beaten last week by Barrington. The Cambridge men made a splendid struggle, however, against a team which is, now a hot favourite for the cup. Going in first the Railways were dismissed for 68, and of this meagre total Wella claimed 40. Barrington lost eight wickets for 55, but Disbury and Coote faced the crisis splendidly, and the visitors won by two wickets.

Albert Institute II. made a wretched show against the Regent in the Junior Cup on Saturday and were not the same team that beat the Old Chesterton Club. They only batted nine men, who made the very poor score of 55. R. Clark (18) and F. Allen (1) put on 29 for the second wicket, but nobody else did much. A constable bowled with great success, doing the "hat-trick," and taking 6 wickets for 25. The Regent scored 51 before losing the first wicket, and with the next man in passed the Albert score.

ISLEHAM CRICKET CLUB.

The Isleham cricket card is now complete. Out of 16 matches, 10 have been won, five lost, and one drawn. The Married v. Single match in the Feast week is, of course, excluded from this calculation. In the first (friendly) match at Newmarket, G. P. M. Robins played for the club and made a century (112 not out). In the Newmarket and District League (in which competition Isleham were the holders of the cup), Isleham's first check was at Fortham. Playing a man short on a wet wicket, it looked like the visitors' game, but a badly missed catch enabled Burwell to make a draw of it. After that Exning (this year's League leaders) beat Isleham at home and away. These were all the defeats Isleham sustained until after the leadership had been decided, when they made no sort of a show against Newmarket at Newmarket. Still the cup is "going round" the clubs, and Burwell, who jumped off with the lead this season, might keep it up next summer.

Cambs. v. Norfolk.

NORFOLK WIN BY AN INNINGS AND 67.

Cambs. commenced their return match against Norfolk in delightful weather on the King's School Ground, Lynn, on Monday. When the counties met earlier in the season at Newmarket Cambs. scored a sweeping victory, and they were hopeful of repeating the performance on this occasion. Six changes were made from the team which lost to Beds. H. C. Tebbutt, A. S. Ling, F. E. Collier, H. R. Barker, F. Roberson and A. C. Bellars coming in for F. W. Bryan, T. Brown, B. Gray, W. Froment, G. Ross and A. Stearn. Norfolk, who were at full strength, won the toss, and elected to bat first. They opened their innings with the Rev. J. G. McCormick and A. K. Watson, the bowling being shared by the usual Cambs. pair, Coulson and B. W. Pigg. The wicket was rather awkward to start with, but there was every prospect of it improving, so both batsmen were content to wait. Coulson, who was making the ball turn a lot, was treated with particular respect. Only three runs were scored off his first seven overs. The first ball of his eighth over McCormick drove finely for four. The next ball he tried to treat in the same fashion, but it was altogether too much for him, and he was cleaned bowled, having made 12 out of the first 29. G. A. Stevens, the new-comer, was nearly bowled by Coulson in the same over, and after that he played with extreme caution. Watson, however, was batting confidently, and at 42 Reid went on for Pigg. A couple of fours off the new bowler sent up the 50 as the result of just under an hour's play. Then both batsmen quickened up, and runs came much faster. Reid being knocked about a good deal. At 73, Bellars went on for Coulson, and Barker for Reid. The double century had no effect. The batsmen scored as freely as ever, and the century was hoisted as the result of 80 minutes' play. Directly afterwards Coulson took the ball from Barker, and Pigg went on at the other end. The pair were thus bowling at opposite ends to those at which they were first tried. In Coulson's second over Stevens, who had been catching Watson fast, reached his 50. Watson was then 48, and a magnificent drive off Pigg brought him his half century. At lunch the partnership had put on just 100.

On resuming, the pair continued to score freely, and the total had reached 145 before Watson was very smartly taken behind the wicket. The subsequent men scored just as freely, and eventually Norfolk ran up a score of 379. The feature of the innings was a fine 104 by G. A. Stevens. He gave one chance of stumping, but beyond that his display was faultless. He was batting two hours and a quarter before he was brilliantly caught by Reid in the long field. Cambs. had less than an hour's batting, and in that time they lost six wickets for 52.

On Tuesday, though the remaining batsmen played with care, the innings closed with the visitors in a minority of 278. The old Oxonsen, Rev. G. B. Raikes, who had wrought such havoc among the Cambs. batsmen upon the opening day, again showed the bowling with Gibson against the not-outs, H. R. Barker and Watts. The professional for a period tried forcing tactics. Two or three good drives off Raikes promised well, but before he was fairly set he lifted one to the boundary, where G. Stevens brought off a good catch. The captain and Barker acted mainly on the defensive. They added 26 to the score, when Barker was quite beaten by a good ball from Raikes. The eighth wicket fell at 89. It was a struggle to make the hundred. The captain was going well, batting confidently, when a late cut brought disaster. The stroke took the ball past the wicket-keeper in such a position that Page could not take it. He, however, made a jump for the ball, just touched it, and deflected its course into the hands of Gibson standing in the slips. Bellars, the last man in, made things lively for a brief space, and at noon Cambs. were out for 101.

An uphill task faced the visitors in entering upon the second innings. The most they could hope for was a draw, but such a prospect seemed remote when Coulson and Collier were dismissed cheaply. Raikes and Gibson again took up the attack, and were bowling as well as ever. Reid and Coulson were the opening batsmen. Taking no risks, they put on 23 when a clinking ball from Gibson disturbed Coulson's heels. Collier, the new-comer, was soon in difficulties with Raikes' bowling. He scored a couple, was beaten and beaten again, and upon a third occasion his wicket was down. Meanwhile Reid had been playing faultlessly. His defence was perfect. At the end of an hour's batting he had 42 to his credit, while Ling, by whom he was partnered after Collier's retirement, was putting in some useful work. Reid gave a hard chance at the wicket off Smith, and Page being a shade too late let the opportunity go. Ling appeared to be well set when a fast, breaking ball whipped across, and a promising partnership was at an end. The same over saw the advent and retirement of Watts. He tried to turn Stevens to leg, miscalculated, and the ball rose to point, where Smith brought off an easy catch. Just before lunch Reid had another hit at the wicket. At the interval the total was 96 for four wickets.

A couple of wickets fell very soon after the resumption. The hundred had just been telegraphed, when Reid was out to precisely the same kind of stroke which caused his retirement in the first innings. He came forward to a short-pitched one from Raikes, the break took the ball to Page behind the wicket, who was held to have whipped off the bails before the batsman could slide his foot back across the crease. Reid had batted about an hour and three-quarters for 57, an invaluable contribution. The first ball of the next over from Smith bowled Tebbutt. Then began one of the most

attractive partnerships of the match. F. Roberson and B. W. Pigg but in very dissimilar styles. The former played himself in carefully, a sturdy defence being varied by well-placed drives. Pigg, on the other hand, went in for hitting, and hitting only. He let out at most things that came his way, and within a very few minutes had collected 13. Then the stroke of luck he experienced in the first innings was repeated in just the same way. Raikes put one up just outside the crease, Pigg let go, and skied the ball to Beresford at long-off. Beresford, with the sun in his eyes, miscalculated the flight of the ball, and let off Pigg, who went merrily on, driving right and left until Durrant caught him close on the boundary. The partnership yielded 46. Roberson, partnered by Barker, went on playing sound cricket. His experience stood him in good stead in dealing with the wiles of Raikes, who got an astonishing amount of work on the ball. Barker made a couple of splendid shots to the on boundary off Smith, who at 182 gave way to Stevens (G.). The separation, however, came from the other end. Running half-way up the pitch, Raikes smartly caught and bowled Barker. The captain had had luck in being bowled by a rising ball, which took him in the chest and then pitched upon the wicket. Roberson sent up the 200 with a fine drive off Raikes, and the next over completed his 50. He was not out when the innings concluded, having played a splendid game for his side. Norfolk thus won easily by an innings and 67 runs.

NORFOLK v. CAMBS.

CAMBS. FOLLOW ON.

BRILLIANT INNINGS VICTORY OF NORFOLK.

Norfolk followed up the great advantage they secured at Lynn on the first day of this match, and by a quarter to four yesterday afternoon the home eleven had obtained a brilliant victory by an innings and 67 runs. Everything depended upon the Norfolk bowlers yesterday, as the wicket was fast and true, and it is pleasing to record that they rose to the occasion in great style. In less than two hours before lunch Cambridgeshire's first innings was finished off for the addition of 49 runs, and the visitors also lost the first four batsmen in their second innings, eight men in all being got rid of for 145 runs. After the interval seventy-eight minutes sufficed to bring the match to a happy conclusion, the six remaining wickets going down for 115 runs. L. J. Reid made a splendid effort to avert defeat, batting nearly an hour and a half in admirable style. After he left F. Roberson took up the task, but beyond some hitting by B. W. Pigg, and some help from H. Barker, he received very little support. The Rev. G. B. Raikes was punished rather freely in this innings, but, as the game stood, wickets were of more importance to Norfolk than runs, and he secured four, thus bringing up his total bag to eleven, five being taken on Monday and six yesterday. It is doubtful whether Norfolk possessed another bowler who could have done so well on the hard wicket, and the clergyman's bowling was an important factor in the defeat of Cambridgeshire. Raikes has been persuaded to go on to Lincoln with the team for the last match of the season, and with him Norfolk entertain hopes of avenging another defeat. Stevens of Lynn met with better luck yesterday, and his success with the ball at two periods in the innings was very popular with the crowd. Although falling short of Monday's figures, the attendance yesterday was most encouraging, and it was growing with the brighter and warmer weather when the match finished.

The weather was much cooler on Tuesday morning, the wind having changed round, and the sky was overcast. The dew had been much lighter than on the Monday morning, and the wicket rolled out dry and firm for Cambridgeshire to continue their innings, in which six wickets had been last overnight in fifty minutes for 52 runs. There was no reason why Cambridgeshire should not hope for many runs, and it was recognized that a good deal depended upon Watts, who played a not out century against Norfolk at Newmarket. Watts had 8 runs standing to his credit when the innings was resumed, H. R. Baker being his partner. Watts soon made a couple of fours by big drives off G. B. Raikes, but was out in the next over in attempting another big hit. Stevens, the Lynn professional, making a splendid running catch from long off, having to run a good way to reach the ball, which came to him at an awkward angle. Charles Pigg went in to make some excellent late cuts, but at 89 Barker paid the penalty of his impatience, and was bowled in hitting too soon at Raikes. Smith relieved Gibson, and it was the combination of this pair which brought about the dismissal of the Cambridgeshire captain, Gibson making a clever catch at first slip, the ball being turned in his direction by the wicketkeeper. Coulson, who hit the first ball he received from Raikes to deep square leg, where A. K. Watson unexpectedly failed to make the catch, and had two e-scapes from a run out, being on one occasion at the same wicket as his captain, was undefeated at the end, which came at twelve minutes before noon, with the acceptance of a skier taken by J. G. McCormick at mid-off from A. E. Bellars, who collected 9 in quick time. The last four wickets had gone down in thirty-five minutes for the addition of 49 runs, and Cambridgeshire were batting altogether 86 minutes for their total of 101. Raikes and Smith divided the remaining wickets of the first innings yesterday morning, and the old Oxonian's record for the innings was 7 wickets for 63. It was a fine performance, and would have been even better if all the catches had been taken.

Holding a lead of 278, Norfolk decided to make Cambridgeshire follow on, for although the wicket was still easy and fast Norfolk were anxious to secure the maximum points, and they went boldly for a win. To have adopted the alternative policy of batting again would have made a draw almost certain. Coulson ac-

companied L. J. Reid to the wickets at seven minutes past twelve, and Gibson began the bowling with a new ball. Both batsmen were successful in driving Raikes, but at 23 Gibson bowled Coulson, and F. E. Collier, who followed in, could make nothing of the slow bowler, and it was not surprising to see him bowled. The score, with two wickets down, was 36. Sam Ling joined Reid, and Brentford's new goalkeeper promptly hit Raikes for two 4s in one over. Reid also helped the score along, making a wise choice of the ball to hit and playing Raikes better than most batsmen. Smith and Stevens took up the bowling, and when the partnership had produced 45 runs in half an hour Stevens sent Ling's stump flying, the ball coming across the full width of the wicket. In the same over the Lynn professional took another valuable wicket, Watts trying to turn a ball to leg which got up rather quickly, hit the shoulder of the bat, and went in the direction of point, where Smith took an easy catch. Reid, who had a life at the wicket when 42 off Smith, completed his 50 soon after the arrival of H. C. Tebbutt. The bowlers met with no further success before lunch, when the score was 96 for four wickets, of which Reid claimed 56.

While the players were away the sun got through, and the game was resumed beneath a blue sky patched with white. Raikes and Smith took up the bowling, and Allsopp came out to field for the Norfolk captain, who had a bruised right hand. Reid had increased his score by only 1 run when he was smartly stunned by Page off the slow bowler; and Tebbutt, playing late at the next ball bowled by Smith from the other end, had his wicket broken, the fifth and sixth wickets falling at 101. Reid was batting just under an hour and a half, and made 57 by admirable cricket. F. Roberson and B. W. Pigg were next associated, and as usual the latter took all the risks. Fortune again favoured him, as Beresford at long-off failed to catch him off a straight drive, Raikes being the bowler. Pigg's score at the time was 13, and he subsequently made some powerful drives and leg hits. He had another escape from being caught from a lightning return which went low to Raikes' right hand. Roberson was very successful with strokes to leg, and played nicely to the off, but at 147 he lost the company of Pigg, Durrant bringing off a good catch at long-on. Pigg scored 29 out of 46 in twenty minutes. H. R. Barker gave Roberson valuable assistance, and the pair gave Norfolk a good deal of trouble. The run-getting was practically monopolised by Roberson, whose play on the leg side was particularly good. The wicket had put on 43 when a brilliant catch by Raikes off his own bowling dismissed Barker, the eighth wicket falling at 180. Seven runs later Charles Pigg was bowled off his body, a ball from Stevens getting up sharply. With Bellars, the eleventh man in, Roberson sent up 200 with a beautiful off drive, and had completed his 50 when Bellars had his stumps disarranged by a fast ball from Stevens. Going in at the fall of the fifth wicket at 101, Roberson was undefeated at the close, having batted eighty minutes for an extremely good 54. The innings closed at seventeen minutes to four, in the presence of a good company, having lasted two hours and thirty-nine minutes, a total of 211 having been obtained from sixty-three overs. Norfolk thus gained a splendid victory by an innings and 67 runs. Stevens captured two valuable wickets before lunch, and, bagging the last two of the innings, he secured the excellent analysis of four for 25, which was easily the best bowling performance of the innings.

NORFOLK v. CAMBRIDGESHIRE

BRILLIANT-BATTING BY NORFOLK PLAYERS.

CENTURY BY GEOFFREY STEVENS.

HOME COUNTY IN A STRONG POSITION.

Regarded from every point of view, the experiment of playing a County match at King's Lynn has so far been a brilliant success. The head master, school governors, and a special local committee, with the Rev. F. A. S. folkes of Wolferton as chairman, spared neither time nor labour in the effort to induce the people of the town and the surrounding districts to appreciate this new departure of the County club, and the result was in every way most satisfactory. There was an excellent attendance, as good, in fact, as was seen on the best day at Norwich last week, and the presence of many ladies on the terrace in front of King Edward VII. Grammar School gave a touch of picturesqueness to the scene, and the school ground, it may be noted, is by no means lacking in natural beauty, the background of trees offering a pretty view. The playing ground itself is mainly a tribute to the monumental work of George Stevens, the chief groundsman. Some three years ago it was marshland, interspersed by dykes. To-day it is a ground upon which any county would be quite content to play its matches. No one could have worked harder than Stevens did to get the ground in a fit condition for so important a match, though only those who knew the ground before he took it in hand could fully appreciate the labour involved. The best testimony he could have of the excellence of the pitch was provided by the Norfolk eleven. In four and a-half hours the home County compiled 379, easily its highest total of the season, and but for the desire to make runs quickly and get Cambridgeshire in for an hour or so at the end of the day, the Norfolk innings might now have been unfinished. Fortune at last smiled upon the Norfolk captain, and after he had won the toss for the first time, his batsmen did their best to put the side in a safe position. The Rev. J. G. McCormick was dismissed rather easily, and whilst the wicket was a little damp from the heavy dew, but afterwards Norfolk did splendidly, and on the faster wicket runs were made at a splendid pace. Geoffrey Stevens was associated in two long partnerships of three figures each with A. K. Watson and R. A. A. Beresford, and during their stay no one could wish for better batting. Stevens has had to wait a long time this season for his first 100, and the privilege of seeing it made was reserved for West Norfolk. Watson's was a most valuable knock, as he went in when the bowlers were at their best, whilst Beresford gave a really brilliant display. Over one period he and Stevens scored at 120 an hour. A little tired by their long outing beneath a blazing sun, Cambridgeshire had a bad final fifty minutes against G. B. Raikes and Gibson, six wickets being lost in that time for 52 runs, and they are therefore in a very bad position. Raikes took a wicket with his first ball, and captured four others very cheaply, two being obtained through the brilliant assistance of S. D. Page behind the wicket.

Cambridgeshire made several changes from the side which beat Norfolk so decisively at Newmarket last month, the side being captained by C. Pigg, the old Hertfordshire player. Norfolk had S. D. Page back in the team, and the Rev. G. B. Raikes and R. A. A. Beresford made welcome re-appearances, the clergyman having last played in 1906 and the Hunstanton man in 1903. In response to a late summons, Allsopp made the journey, but the Rev. J. G. McCormick's knee was better than he expected, and except for some fielding as substitute for Ling during the first hour, the Norwich City footballer played the part of a spectator. The wicket was a trifle damp on the surface as the result of a heavy dew, and B. W. Pigg, who bowled from the school end, used sawdust to get a better footing. Coulson, who, it will be remembered, took eight Norfolk wickets for 5 runs at Newmarket, commenced the bowling, and with the wicket and a breeze blowing from the direction of third man to help him, it would have occasioned no surprise if Coulson had met with a lot of success. The Rev. J. G. McCormick and A. K. Watson, who opened the innings, found Pigg the less difficult of the bowlers to score from, and Watson made two pretty cuts. The clergyman drove Coulson over mid-off's head to the seats, but the next ball bowled him, the first wicket falling at 29, of which McCormick claimed an even dozen. G.

A Stevens came in, and opened with a neat leg glance off the fast bowler, who gave up the ball at 42 to L. J. Reid, a slow leg-break bowler. Picking the right ball to hit, the batsman, against whom there were several appeals for leg before, took the score to 50 in fifty-six minutes. Watson made a beautiful ground shot from Coulson past cover to the seats, and played forcing strokes in front of the wicket in his best style. A double change of bowling was tried at 73. A. E. Bellars and H. R. Barker going on, and with the wicket playing faster the pace of scoring increased, Stevens making some delightful cuts and square leg hits. The 100 appeared in eighty-four minutes, and Coulson took up the bowling from the opposite end to that from which he first bowled. A fast return from Ling at third man, the ball hitting the wicket, nearly resulted in Stevens being run out, but with Pigg on again Stevens reached his 50. Watson's score being 48. The Ipswich schoolmaster caught Stevens up with a big on drive off Pigg, and at lunch the pair were still together with the score at 129, the partnership having so far produced 100 runs in seventy-one minutes.

Luncheon was served to upwards of 200 in the big hall at the school, those present including the Mayor of Lynn (Mr. R. Green), Sir William folkes, M^r Holcombe Ingleby, Mr. N. P. Jodrell, Colonel Seppings, Mr. R. O. Ridley, Captain Digby, R.N., Mr. T. Brown, and many ladies.

After the interval Bellars and Coulson were entrusted with the bowling, and as not infrequently happens, luncheon proved the best change bowler for the fielding side, as after making two beautiful 4s in front of the wicket, Watson was smartly caught by the wicket-keeper, the batsman hitting the ball hard. The splendid partnership for the second wicket produced 116 runs in an hour and twenty minutes, and Watson, who was batting four minutes under two hours scored 66 out of 145. He batted faultlessly, watching the ball well, and cutting and driving splendidly. His placing was particularly good, and among his scoring strokes were eight 4s and three 3s. Joined by R. A. A. Beresford, the old Norvicensian had a narrow escape of being run out, starting for a run and getting back only just in time. Shortly afterwards he stepped out to drive a ball from Pigg, and offered a chance of stumping, which Watts failed to accept. Beresford began confidently, his first scoring shot being a fine drive off Coulson. Subsequently runs came very fast, both batsmen playing with delightful freedom, and scoring rapidly all round the wicket. Beresford's superb cutting was a special feature, and with Stevens also finding the boundary frequently, the second hundred appeared at ten minutes past three. Beresford scored 10 off three successive balls from Coulson, twice cutting the ball to the seats, but in the same over he offered a chance of stumping. The fieldsmen were moved frequently, but without cramping the scoring strokes of the batsmen, and 102 runs had been added in sixty-four minutes when the partnership was broken, Geoffrey Stevens, who had just completed his 100, being caught near the screen off a lofty hit from Tebbutt. Going in at the fall of the first wicket at 29, Stevens was third out at 247. He was nearly bowled by Coulson at the outset of his innings, but after settling down he was never in difficulties, and except for a chance of stumping when 60, he never made a mistake during a stay of two hours and a quarter. Splendid cutting and strong leg hitting were the main features of his batting, and the chief scoring strokes which went to the making of his first three figure innings of the season were eleven 4s, six 3s, eight 2s. Beresford did not long survive Stevens, as jumping in to drive he made a "yorker" of a ball from Tebbutt. The Hunstanton player was fourth out at 257 and in rather less than an hour he scored 63 out of 112. It was a grand innings, his wrist work in cutting and the power of his hitting in front of the wicket and to leg being delightful to see. He obtained nine boundaries, three 3s, and five 2s. The Rev. G. B. Raikes went in with the intention of making runs quickly, and he brought off several magnificent off drives. Barker stopped and made a frantic attempt to catch a hot return from the clergyman, and the latter had made 25 out of 36 in twenty-three minutes, and hit four 4s, when he was well caught low down at long off by Collier. The latter neglected an opportunity of catching C. E. Durrant in the same spot soon after the arrival of Gibson, and the 300 was hoisted at four minutes past four, the third 100, having been made in fifty-five minutes. Gibson collected 11, and was then caught at point by the Cambridgeshire captain, and at 329 Durrant was joined by his captain. Coulson went on again to obtain his 50th county wicket of the season by bowling Durrant, who showed excellent form during a stay of fifty-five minutes, scoring 26 out of 72. With the fall of Durrant's wicket at 329, the tea interval was taken. Cambridgeshire again profited by an interruption in the game, as on resuming Stevens was bowled first ball by Coulson, and 6 runs later Wilson was bowled by one of Tebbutt's expressions. S. D. Page and Smith added 44 for the last wicket in twenty-three minutes, both

hitting out well, and Page making some big drives. The end came at twenty minutes past five, Smith starting to run without knowing where the ball was, and as it only went towards point he was easily run out, leaving Page to carry out his bat for 18. Norfolk made their 579 runs off 100 overs in four hours and a-half. Tebbutt, who went on at 229 to break up the Stevens-Beresford partnership, took five of the last eight wickets, varying his pace from very fast to slow.

Cambridgeshire, with under an hour to play, started very badly, as after an over from Gibson had produced three byes, G. B. Raikes bowled F. E. Collier with his first ball, which kept rather low. L. J. Reid and F. G. Roberson took the score to 18, and then the latter, turning round and placing a rising ball from Raikes to leg, was brilliantly caught by the wicket-keeper. Reid, who went all through Cambridgeshire's first innings against Norfolk at Newmarket, was next partnered by A. S. Ling, whose previous knock against the Norfolk bowling produced 123 runs. The Swindon goalkeeper hit Raikes for 3 spanking 4s in one over, and then with the total at 28 Raikes captured a third wicket, Page smartly stumping Reid. Two runs later Gibson bowled Ling, four men being thus disposed of inside half an hour. H. C. Tebbutt joined B. W. Pigg, and the latter, when 2, was missed at extra cover by Beresford off Raikes. Two runs later young Pigg had another life, G. A. Stevens dropping him at long-on, but the total was only 39 when Norfolk captured their fifth wicket, Raikes following up and making a brilliant catch off his own bowling, Tebbutt hitting the ball very hard. A skier to mid-off, where the ball was safely held by McCormick, dismissed Pigg, Raikes at this stage having taken five wickets in nine overs for 36 runs. Gibson was marking time at the other wicket, only 5 runs having been hit from his nine overs. H. R. Barker and Watts were together when stumps were drawn with the score at 52 for six wickets, Cambridgeshire being 327 behind with only four wickets left.
