


## Uddingston

There is one addition William M Montgomerie who went to Hillhead High School and is listed in their roll of honour as playing for Uddingston.



Bellshill Speaker 29 April 1921

Last Saturday the opening match the cricket season was played, when the Uddingston Cricket Club met and defeated Glasgow High School F.P. There was a fairly good attendance of spectators although the weather was not all that might have been wished for. Before the match began a beautiful brass tablet was unveiled in memory of the eleven members of the club who fell during the late war. The unveiling ceremony was performed by the popular president of the club, Mr J. R. Taylor, who assisted by the Rev. G. S. Peebles. B.D., minister of Uddingston Parish Church. In unveiling the tablet Mr Taylor said- -When the call to arms went through this country, the Uddingston Cricket Club sent from their members, sixty three men, who joined the Colours. Of these sixty-three men some returned in sound health, much to the joy of all their friends; some came back suffering from wounds from which in the end they recovered, some came back maimed and crippled. and the remnant never came back at all. The members considered that in the latter case it was right and fitting that some memorial should erected in their memory, and at the general meeting of the club it was decided that this should be done. It was also decided that memorial should take the form of a mural tablet upon which would inscribe the names of the fallen. Mr Clow Ross was entrusted with the task of looking after this part of the work, and you all know that he has done his work very successfully. Of all those men who went out there we can only speak with the greatest respect. Everyone whether wounded, unwounded, or killed certainly did his duty and are worthy of all honour, but for those who are dead it is for the club in the future to reminded them this tablet. I shall now read out their names—George Boyd, William Bryson, Robert M. Cunningham, William H. Gandy, David Kennedy, Thomas Lander, L. J. Lightfoot, Thomas

Nelson, Hugh Scott, James Watson, and Alexander H. Young. I now unveil the tablet. It is my hope that in future when members of this club and visitors who come into the pavilion and go out, when they look at this memorial, they will not merely look upon it as a record of the names of dead men. It stands for something higher, something nobler than that, and it stands for the real spirit of sportsmanship. A Scottish Rifles bugler sounded "The Last Post." and suitable bagpipe music was played by Mr Taylor's son. The singing "God Save the King" brought very impressive ceremony to end. The tablet is a handsome piece of work. Set on a solid oak frame upon which are carved Scottish thistles, it is, indeed, a worthy tribute to our fallen heroes. The work was executed by the Metallic Art Co., Old Dumbarton, Glasgow.
