The scorecard is printed as above on page 11 of the book, with Reid bowling out all ten Tichborne batters in their first innings, and bowling seven batters in their second innings. To confuse things, two pages later Fellowes says that Reid "took 9 wickets in the first innings and 7 in the second, while the catch and lbw in the second innings may also have been off his bowling. Sixteen wickets clean bowled in one match go near to being a cricket record".

So while uncertainty remains over whether Reid took nine or ten wickets in the first innings, and 16 or 17 – or more – in the match, this scorecard is placed in the 'Curiosities and Near Misses' section rather than in the main part of the Major Feats project. But it's a close-run thing.

The scorecard in Fellowes' book names the match as being between 'Commoners and Town, at Tichborne'. His text identifies the Commoners' opponents as Tichborne [rather than the town of Winchester], and that has been followed here.

'Commoners' at Winchester are fee-paying students, as distinct from scholars who are known as 'Collegemen'.

The names of the players for Ovens District are as given in that source, though there are some differences between the names of the local players as against those who had played in the two-day (extended to three) played between Owens District and the touring HH Stephenson's XI on 9-11 January: Cricket Archive names some of the local players as J Orr, SU Brown, CA Reid and WJ Browne. It is not known whether or not these were the same individuals as the similarly-named players as given above.

The '11 v 1' match appears, from the item in *Cricket*, to have arisen from a challenge following the three-day game, in which Griffith had scored 46 in his only innings but had not taken a wicket (did he even bowl?). After that match 'an enthusiastic Australian said he would back [George] Griffith to beat any eleven on the ground, he having three to field, a feat he accomplished easily'. His innings bowling figures of 10-0 certainly make it look pretty easy.

This match is also mentioned on page 97 of David Frith's *The Trailblazers* (Boundary Books, 1999).

Ties on both innings of a match are rare enough, but what makes this match of particular note is that it was not just a tie on both first and second innings, but the the second innings totals were exactly half of those in the first innings.

Source: *Newcastle Chronicle* 14 November 1868, which reports the match as having been played "the other day ... between two elevens chosen from the members of the United Cricket Club, Mr Wells being captain of one eleven and Mr Ross of the other". Both Wells and Wills played for one side, and the paper heads the scorecard of this team as "Mr Wills' side". So who was the captain? Gross says Wills, but on unknown evidence.

12 men batted for each side in their first innings, and 14 in their second. It is not known if 'GW Wills' who caught Lavis in Ross (2) was a substitute, or 'W Wills' given his full initials.

If the two lbws were taken by Mathew Curry, as is possible (the source does not identify the bowler in question, neither does it comment on Curry's success in the game), then Gross's crediting him with 20 wickets in the match is correct: but 20 out of 24 rather than out of 22 as suggested by Gross's description of the match as 'Wills XII v Ross's XII'. However, Alfred James has advised that Curry only took eight wickets (not nine) in Ross (1), and that therefore his actual tally was only 19 out of 24.

Gross records that CI Thornton scored 188 out of 210 runs when playing for Munro's XI v Oakham Grammar School [sic] in 1874 [sic]. The above score is taken from the *Leicester Journal* of 30 May 1873 (which names only ten players in the school side), and is clearly the match in question. Team-names and batting orders are as given in that source, but it is thought that the batting order shown for Exton may be that of their second innings only (Thornton himself said that he batted at no. 8 in the first innings, but opened in the second).

The tight binding of the source newspaper in the BNA means that it is not possible to read all second-innings details, including the all-out total in Exton (2). But the readable details indicate that Thornton's runs were made out of 210 off the bat - in which case his proportion of 89.52% of his side's runs off the bat means that he does not quite reach the 90% threshold for inclusion in the main lists.

The *Journal* says that Thornton hit ten sixes and three fours (and 18 threes) in his innings of 188. Thornton's own recollection, as published in *The Cricketer* 6 August 1921 page 5, was that he made 13 hits out of the ground, but the more contemporary source seems likely to be more reliable.

Future England cricketer Gilbert Jessop was ten days past his 21st birthday when he took 15 wickets for 4 runs in this match. He had made his first-class debut for Gloucestershire the previous season. In 1895 he was teaching at Beccles College, for whom in that season he scored 1058 runs at 132.25 and took 100 wickets at 2.44.

There are several differences between the scorecard details in the sources. The *Daily Times* (30 May) and *Gazette* both give an all-out total for St Aubyn's (1) of 12; their scorecard then correctly adds to 12, and that has been followed here. However, the *Independent* says that St Aubyn's were all out for 11 in their first innings, but their individual scores total to 14 (with HW Hinde scoring 4). In St Aubyn's second innings, the scores above are as published in the *Independent*, but the *Daily Times* has Hodsell out for 3, Chignell out for 0, and Williams left 0*. Both versions total to 7. The *Gazette* also gives the team total as 7, but credits C Williams [sic] with 3 runs, meaning that the batters' scores plus extras total 10; in other respects the *Gazette* matches the *Independent* for this innings.

The *Independent* and *Gazette* both credit Jessop with 4 maidens in St Aubyn's first innings, but the *Daily Times* only credits him with 3. All sources are agreed that Jessop took three hat-tricks in the match, and that he took six wickets in the course of seven deliveries in St Aubyn's second innings. The name of GW Sanders in the St Aubyn's side is sometimes given as Saunders.

Gross records that EHD Sewell scored 74 out of 78, and 51 out of 56, for the Salt Department in this match. It is not clear whether 78 and 56 were his side's all-out totals (in which case he scored 94.87% and 91.07% of his team's runs in the respective innings, and 93.28% of his team's runs in the match), or just the number of runs added in each innings while Sewell was at the wicket. The latter appears to be the case, as in *Cricket* 1902 page 115 FS Ashley-Cooper records that in this match Sewell "claimed 125 of the 134 runs obtained *whilst in*" [my emphasis].

The match is not noted in *Cricket*. There are potentially two contemporary Madras newspapers (the *Mail* and the *Times*) at the British Library, but these have not yet been explored.

Under the prevailing Laws of cricket, the result of this match was a tie even though Eastman's Royal Naval Academy were not all out in their second innings. Like the Cranbury Park v I Zingari match in 1864 (qv), the match was a tie on both first and second innings, with the second innings totals exactly half those of the first innings.

A letter to *Cricket* from Peter Symonds' School said that at the call of time, the scorers announced the score of Eastmans' second innings to be 26, and so another over was allowed, in which they scored a single – only for it to be discovered a little later that the score at 'time' was actually 25, and the 'winning' run in the extra over had caused the match to be tied rather than won.

This match is included in Robert Brooke's list in 'Milestones' in *The Cricketer* March 1996 page 21 of those scoring a century and taking 14 or more wickets in a match. The above details are from *Cricket* 1909 page 20.

Faulkner's 17 wickets out of 28 fell proportionally well short of the 75% (15 out of 20) otherwise needed to qualify for this 'Major Feat', but his performance is still worth recording here. Johannesburg were set 160 to win in under 2 hours; Faulkner and Heeley added 115 for their third wicket in 55 minutes.

Pawson and Gainsford added 144* for the tenth wicket to secure the victory for Oundle School, and by the end of the match their stand was worth 161* (as stated by Gross). But although for the tenth wicket, as this was a 12-a-side match it was not a partnership for the last wicket, which would otherwise bring it into qualification for the main part of this project. The partners in the tenth wicket stand were Guy Bernard Gainsford, b 16.4.1903 (d. 26.2.1938); Leonard Baden Pawson, b 31.8.1900 (d. 6.1.1963).

The Laxtonian says that the stand between Selwyn-Payne and French was for the sixth wicket, but from the batting order it was for the seventh.

The spelling 'McHwaithe' is given in both occurrences in *The Laxtonian*, but no-one of that surname was recorded in the UK census of 1911, or anywhere else in ancestry.co.uk. 'McIlwraith[e]' would seem more likely, but no Sergeant of that name has been traced in online military records.

After three overs of their innings, Victoria College had scored 2 runs for 6 wickets, with singles off the first ball of the innings, and off a ball in Dorning's first over. McCall's figures at this point were 3-2-1-5. WA Mitchell and Le Brun then added 158 for the seventh wicket – 94.05% of the eventual innings total, and 98.75% of the runs off the bat. McGill, Murphy and Kemp (and no others) were all out first ball, but there is no mention in either the local newspaper or either school magazine of McCall taking a hat-trick (let alone two, as stated in *The Cricketer*).

The *Weekly Post* has Nobes caught and bowled by McCall, but the report in *The Victorian* says he was caught at square-leg, and credits the catch to Knapp. *The Victorian* alone has Jackson stumped by Henderson, but *The Clavinian* is explicit that he was not dismissed by the wicket-keeper. The wicket-keeper for Weymouth College was probably WB Young, though Ormiston also kept wicket for them in some matches. All sources record that Le Brun was missed by the keeper when still in single figures; he went on to hit 20 fours and one six. He was dismissed at 160; WA Mitchell was ninth out. The result – a win for Weymouth College by three wickets – is taken from *The Clavinian*, but the score at the fall of their eighth and ninth wickets is nowhere stated.

In Army (1), Monks took a hat-trick, and ended the innings with a separate 4-in-4. He then took a further hat-trick in Army (2). Three hat-tricks in a match does not quite qualify for the main lists, but two hat-tricks and a further 4-in-4 comes close. The report in *The Cricketer* suggests that he did not open the bowling in Army (1), as it refers to his [first] hat-trick as coming "soon after he went on".

Wicket-keeper Rowley did not let a bye in either Army innings.

What makes the match noteworthy is that South Brisbane were bowled out twice in the same afternoon by a father-and-son pairing. Leo and Brian O'Connor bowled unchanged through both innings. Brian O'Connor's match figures were 12-25, his father's 8-43.

Leo O'Connor can almost certainly be identified with Leo Patrick Devereaux O'Connor (1890-1985) who played 46 first-class matches, mainly for Queensland, as a WK/batter between 1912/13 and 1929/30 (he only bowled three deliveries in his entire first-class career); while Brian can with equal confidence be identified with Brian Redmond Devereaux O'Connor (1913-1963) who played five first-class matches for Queensland in 1934/35 and 1935/36.

Definitely AV Hunt's match! Alma Victor Hunt (born and died in Bermuda 1910-1999) ended the West Lothian innings with three wickets in four balls before scoring all the runs in his side's winning reply. He faced 33 of the 46 balls bowled in the Aberdeenshire innings, hitting eight fours, two sixes and five singles. The team's innings lasted 25 minutes, and ball-by-ball it went as follows (H and F indicate dot-balls to Hunt and Findlay respectively):

This was a charity match in which Australian Test cricketer George Tribe represented the Timperley side. Only one of the other cricketers named had first-class credentials (Kenneth Fyfe – one fc match for Europeans in India in 1937/38; better known as a rugby union international for Scotland). Eric Gemmell and Jack Crompton (both Levenshulme) were well-known professional footballers of the day.

Although presented here as a single match, the report in the *Guardian* says that it actually consisted of two separate single-innings matches – the first won by Timperley (who batted on after passing the Levenshulme total of 42), and then a second match with 74 minutes batting time for each side – also won by Timperley (by six wickets, before batting on). Clegg is said to have taken 3-7 in this second match – those were presumably his figures when Levenshulme's total of 97 was passed.

A routine Sub-District First XI match ended in a rush when H-EM lost their last seven wickets in 11 balls for just one run. What made it the more remarkable was that those seven wickets consisted of a hat-trick by Arthur Golding, interrupted by a four-in-four from Jack Woodruff. Golding took the fourth wicket of the innings (Morgan) with the last delivery of an eight-ball over. Woodruff then took the wickets of Dickinson, McLeod, Fryer and Rogers with the second, third, fourth and fifth deliveries of the following over before conceding a single to Allsop off the eighth ball, whereupon Golding completed his hat-trick by dismissing Allsop and Merlo with the first two deliveries of his next over, thereby ending the match. H-EM's number 7, Alec Albiston, who came to the wicket with the score at 167-5 (at the non-striker's end: the batters had crossed on the delivery from which Dickinson was caught), did not face a single delivery during this mayhem.

In the Port Melbourne innings, Ray Merlo's nine wickets were consecutive, after Fred Allsop had taken the first wicket to dismiss Golding. The Port Melbourne captain was former Test cricketer Merv Harvey, brother of Neil.

The match is not noted in any newspaper currently in the BNA. There are two contemporary newspapers at the BL – the *Toronto Daily Star* and the *Globe & Mail* – but by 1966 neither was covering domestic cricket, and so neither mentions this performance.

Gross records that M Woodin scored 140* out of 141 off the bat for Municipals in this match, without making clear whether 141 was his side's all-out total, or just the number of runs added while Woodin was at the wicket.

Details of the match have been obtained from the Port Elizabeth *Evening Post* and the *Eastern Province Herald*. From these it turns out that MJB (Mike) Woodin's runs were made out of the last 145 scored in the innings. He scored his first run when the score was 105-7; from then until the declaration he scored 140 runs, Extras contributing four (three leg-byes and a no-ball) and batter number ten 1. He hit 17 fours and two sixes in a 137-minute innings. Woodin had played four first-class matches for Eastern Province between 1963/64 and 1966/67.

So the performance does not reach the threshold as a 'Major Feat', but Woodin's performance is still exceptional. Nine bowlers (all except Kruger and the wicketkeeper) are reported to have bowled in the Union CC innings.

This was Schweppes' second league match of the season, and came eight days after they had been dismissed for 1 in their opening Cup match (see previous page). Seven players played for them in both matches.

In their first league match (played between the two '1 all out' matches) they had scored 29 all out (Garford 16, Extras 10) to lose to Welney by eight wickets.

Over the season as a whole, in matches reported by the *Wisbech Standard* – which is most of them – their highest innings total was 57 (v Walpole Highway A; lost by eight wickets) and their second-highest was 32. Although not again dismissed in single figures, their record included all-out totals of 12, 17, 18 and 19.

They forfeited a number of matches during the scheduled 16-game season, including all their last three matches. Their only league point came in a mid-season tie v Walpole Sports (Sports 27 [Roberts 5-16, J Christieson 5-7]; Schweppes 27 [Nobbs 6-5]), in a match for which they arrived with only eight players and 'borrowed' two home supporters to make up their ten-man team.

Gross names the winning team as 'Barroway Drive', but 'Drove' is correct.

The West Augusta innings was closed after 35 overs. The card above shows their opponents only facing 34 overs, though the source states the result to be a win 'on first innings' for West Augusta. This was a match in the Port Augusta Cricket Association B Grade.

Dunstan's innings of 307 made up 86.72% of his side's innings total, and 88.47% of the runs off the bat. It included nine fours and 40 sixes [sic]. He was seventh out in the innings, meaning that his 307 runs were made out of 318 while he was at the crease, and was batting while 176 legitimate balls were bowled, scoring 307 out of the 318 runs scored in that time. He hit 27 off one over from Broadwood, and 24, 23, 23 and 22 off other overs during the innings.
