As explained in the Introduction, the headers to the scorecards are colour-coded to indicate how comprehensive the scorecard currently is, and how well the feat in question has, or has not, been authenticated from the many sources investigated. This colour-coding is echoed in a number from 1 to 6 placed in the top right-hand corner of each scorecard. The coding used in the third edition differs to some extent from that used in previous editions; the categories are now defined as follows:

1 (Green) Scorecards of matches in which the details and authenticity of the ‘major feat’ in question have been corroborated from the sources named, and scorecard details confirming the feat have been traced.

Instances of pre-1983 feats that appear well-sourced but that were not included in Ernest Gross’s own lists are given the number ‘1N’. These feats may have been omitted by Gross because they never came to his attention, or because he knew about them but had some reason for doubting their authenticity. At present there is no clear evidence on which to base any such doubt – beyond the fact that they were not listed by Gross.

2 (Yellow) As above, except that the exact details of the feat are not confirmed in the sources named, even though the scorecard suggests that it is very likely. (Usually this applies in the case of large partnerships, where the scorecard shows that a substantial number of runs were added for a particular wicket, but where the precise number of runs in the partnership is not stated.)

3 (Pale tan) As Categories 1 or 2 above, but with few if any scorecard details available.

4 (Orange) Instances in which no grounds have been found to doubt the authenticity of the feat as recorded in the sources named, but no further or corroborating details have to date been traced.

5 (Red) Instances that cannot be corroborated despite attempts to do so in a range of sources, and for which the evidence available – or lack of it – gives rise to strong suspicions that the feat as recorded by Gross or others may not have occurred at all.

6 (Blue) Matches already in Cricket Archive, but where research for this project has identified significant additional or corrected details of the scorecard as given there.

The dividing-lines between these classes are not always clear-cut. In particular, some matches currently in Category 4 appear very close to meriting inclusion in Category 5; but in such cases the matches have, for now at least, been given the benefit of the doubt and left in Category 4.

Details of some players' names or initials, and of the names of the bowlers taking particular wickets, differ between the sources. The versions in *Cricket* have been preferred, chiefly because in that version the number of wickets taken by each bowler tallies with the scorecard details. Differences in names in the *Gazette*: for Oakdene, D Smith, J McCabe, Simmons, and Goodal (and no initial for Le Roy); for Norbury College, Edmonds and H Humphreys; dismissals of Daws (1) and Bowers (2) both credited to Robinson rather than R Mayes.

The *Gazette* refers to Oakdene as "a junior team".

Despite Oakdene's low aggregate, only one College batter bettered it – yet his side won by an innings and 34 runs.

Both sources say that SF Barnes took the last five wickets of the Baildon Green innings with successive deliveries, thus corroborating Gross's listing of this feat.

Gross records that AP Wijeytunga (263) and W Fernando (80) added 230 for the eighth wicket in the Railways-PWD innings. The spelling of Wijeytunga is as given by Gross.

The score has been sought in the *Times of Ceylon*, but without success. Indications are that the match was played in 1917 rather than 1918, as the final of the 1917/18 Government Services Competition (Police v Railway; Police won) is reported in the paper of 17 December 1917; it seems likely that this fixture was played in the same competition.

Gross records that wicket-keeper H Whyte made four stumpings off successive deliveries in the Kaikorai School innings.

This feat is corroborated by a report in the *Southland Times* of 7 March 1919, and various other papers, as follows: "A unique performance in public schools' cricket was witnessed at Port Chalmers last Saturday. King, playing for the local team, secured the fine average of eight wickets for three runs, including the 'hat trick'. Whyte, the wicket-keeper, stumped four batters off consecutive balls." Unfortunately no further details of the match are given. The match is also noted in the *Evening Star* (Dunedin) of 28 February 1919, and the *Otago Witness* of 12 March 1919.

The match is not mentioned in the *Otago Daily Times*.

A contemporary report of prizegiving at the Port Chalmers District High School names Herbert Whyte as winning an academic prize around this time, and it would seem very likely that he was the wicketkeeper concerned. It is on the strength of this news item, together with the reference to "public schools' cricket" in the above-quoted report, that indicates that the home team should be shown as above, and not just as 'Port Chalmers' as given by Gross.

The former says that “the last wicket put on 200, of which CH Knott compiled 180-odd while Bond collected twelve”. Gross also has their partnership as 200, but the fall of wickets in the scorebook shows the stand to have been worth ‘only’ 198, and Bathurst’s text confirms this – as did Knott’s own recollections of the match (as noted in Bathurst’s book).

From the scorebook, all of Bond’s runs were scored in singles. Other sources (including the *Nottingham Evening Post* 20 July 1920) say that Knott scored 58 fours and eight sixes, and batted for 3 hours 20 minutes. The details of his boundaries cannot be confirmed from the scorebook, the reproduction of which in Bathurst’s book is not sufficiently clear.

The match was the final of the school’s inter-house competition for 1920. It is not clear whether or not it was completed in a single day, but only one date is given in the sources seen to date.

Scorecards in *The Tonbridgian* show that in earlier house matches in the same season Knott scored 244 and took 13-135 (5-63, 8-72) in the first-round match against Hill Side, and then scored 105 and took 10-48 (7-27, 3-21) in the semi-final against Day Boys A. He thus scored 721 runs at 240.33 and took 37 wickets at 8.97 across the three matches.

Gross records that FA Harvie recorded a hat-trick of stumpings in this match for South Lee, off the bowling of HG Sherrold. Harry Watton has suggested that these were probably brothers-in-law Frederick Harvie and Hubert George Shergold (sic).

The match, or the feat, is not recorded in the *Sydenham, Forest Hill and Penge Gazette*, the *Forest Hill, Sydenham & Penge Examiner*, the *Lewisham Borough News*, the *South London Press*, or any other newspaper currently (April 2023) in the BNA. The contemporary *Lewisham Borough News* records the occasional match by South Lee AC, but not this one; and no player named Harvie (or Harvey) is mentioned in any of its reports or scorecards of the club's matches.

Various possible options at Lewisham library/archives have yet to be explored.

Nowadays, Stillness is a junior and infant school in Brockley Rise, Lewisham.

Gross reverses the batters' scores, giving Percy Watsford 295 and Gus Conran 214, but all contemporary sources support the scorecard as above.

There are no reports of the game continuing on to a second day (which would presumably have been 23 October), although the report in the *Sun* suggests that the above play all took place on "the first day" of the match.

The full Small Arms Factory squad for this match was listed in the *Lithgow Mercury* as consisting of G Conran, P Watsford, McKeveatt, Shepherd, Rickard, McKibbin, Phelan, Hutchison, Hoy, Morton, Chapman (1 and 2) and Noad (1 and 2). It is suspected that 'P Watsford' is the same player as Rev AP Watsford, who captained Bendigo against the touring MCC side in 1950/51, but this has not been confirmed.

This was a match in the Hartley District Cricket Association.

The death of TA Conran [sic – not G Conran; perhaps 'Gus' was a nickname] on 10 September 1944 was noted in the *Lithgow Mercury* on the following day, and in 1951 the paper reported that two new playing areas at the Lithgow District CA's ground had been named as the Conran Oval and the Watsford Oval.

Gross says that G Challenor and Ince added 224 for the 2nd wicket in Wanderers' first innings, and 201 for the second wicket in their second innings. Whilst entirely plausible from the scorecard, the relevant fall of wicket details are not given in the sources. It is known (from the report in the *Globe*) that the score in their first innings had passed 100 before the first wicket fell.

Challenor's figure of 24.6 overs in Pickwick (1) is as given in all editions of the *Globe*. The inference is that eight-ball overs were in use, but this is not confirmed anywhere else, and CA says the match used six-ball overs.

All editions of the *Globe* also show Browne bowling '3.5-1-131-2' in Wanderers (2), but this is assumed to be a misprint for '35 overs'.

The dismissal of KG Wood in Pickwick (2) is not included in the scorecard in the *Globe*, but it is mentioned in the match report that he was caught [by an unnamed fielder] in the deep.

It was reported in *The Cricketer* on 7 May 1921 (page 22) that this match was the second meeting of the sides, arranged as a timeless game because the previous match (in January 1921) did not produce a definite result. The full score of the January match is on Cricket Archive; it is notable that Challenor and Ince also shared a double-century partnership (217 for the second wicket) in Wanderers' only innings of the match.

All the play took place on a single day, beginning at 11.30am; Col. Gillson's XI began their reply "about 4 o'clock". The day's play produced a total of 811 runs for 11 wickets.

The organiser of the visiting side is named as 'Col Gibson' in *The Cricketer* and by Gross, but *The Marlburian* has 'Gillson', and this source is preferred.

The Marlburian gives the score at the fall of the fifth wicket in Gillson's innings as 242, but that is clearly an error (maybe 342?). *The Marlburian* also confirms that seven bowlers were used in the Gillson innings, but only names four.

For the Old Cholmeleians, Maclure and Weaver added 190 for the first wicket in an hour and a half. For Hornsey, Hammond and Wenyon added 102 for the fourth wicket, and Pitcher and Coomber added 145 for the eighth.

Old Cholmeleians are the Old Boys of Highgate School.

Gross records that a player named W White took all 20 wickets for Hughenden in this match, conceding a total of 37 runs in the process. The feat is mentioned in *Cricketer Quarterly* vol 7 no. 2 page 56, where White's figures are given as 10-9 and 10-28.

But there is no report of any such instance in the *Bristol Evening News* for 1921, nor in *The Cricketer*, nor in any newspaper currently (April 2023) in the BNA. Neither have teams named either Hughenden or Woodcroft been found in the Bristol area at any time. Both placenames can be found in England, but not in close proximity (though Harry Watton has noted that there are a Hughenden Road and a Woodcroft Road in Bristol, about 6 miles apart). Roger Gibbons (Gloucestershire CCC President and historian) and his colleagues have been unable to identify anything further about this alleged instance.

I am sceptical about this performance, but further research into it is handicapped without some further information about exactly where – and perhaps when - it took place (if at all).

This match was noted in an item on page 174 of volume 7 of *Cricket Quarterly*, which states only that GA Faulker was 'reputed' to have achieved the feat of scoring a century and taking all-ten in this fixture, but that the feat had not yet been confirmed. Robert Brooke includes the match in his list of such instances that appeared in his 'Milestones' column in *The Cricketer* August 1990 page 32.

Brooke says that GA Faulkner scored 100* and took 10 wickets (for an unknown number of runs) for Hythe.

The feat has not been traced in the BNA. Neither is it mentioned in the *Hythe Reporter* of 1921, although the scores are given of three matches between these two sides in that year – in only one of which Faulkner played (in late August/early September, scoring 54 and taking 5-55). He is shown as taking all-10 for Hythe v Dymchurch on 27 July, and scoring 112 and taking 13-86 (5-51, 8-35) for Hythe v OMTs on 17-18 August [OMT 90 & 106, Hythe 253], but no feat of a century and all-ten in the same match is recorded in this season. His score of 112 against Dymchurch is listed in the *Kentish Express* of 24 September 1921 as being his only century of the season for Hythe.

No such feat is mentioned in 1921 editions of the *Folkestone, Hythe (etc) Herald* or of the *Folkestone ... & Hythe Advertiser*. It seems very likely that CQ's initial hesitation about this performance was fully justified.

The successful Cliffe bowler was fast bowler GJ (Jennings) Tune (1894-1965). The *Goole Journal* states that he “undoubtedly found a spot on the worn pitch from which the ball came off at remarkable speed and seldom left the ground, making him practically unplayable”. At one stage he took five wickets in six balls.

The *Journal* also confirms that Joe Martinson carried his bat through the innings, though its statement that “he never received a ball from Tune” may be open to question.

This was a match in the Howden & District Cricket League.

This match, and that between Watford and Stanmore in which AE Barker took 10-0 for Watford, were played seven days apart.

The identities of the various players named Jones in the Wattstown side are unclear, and it is not known which Thomas took two wickets in the Wattstown innings. The dismissal of C Davies for Ferndale is as given in the source, but is clearly – at best – ambiguous.

Carpenter took a hat-trick, and four wickets in five balls, at one point during the Wattstown innings.

This was a match in the First Division of the Rhondda Cricket League.

The 20 wickets taken by Lou Benaud (father of Richie) included a hat-trick in St Mary's (1). This was a match in the B Grade of the Nepean District Cricket Association (hence the St Mary's side does not need to be identified as 'St Mary's B').

John Edward Acheson Atkinson (1906-1940; killed in action) was a pupil at Winchester, and his obituary in a Supplement to *The Wykehamist* dated 31 March 1941 states that, as a junior at the college, in a match in the internal Melhuish Cup "he made 128 and took all ten wickets on the same afternoon". But there is no mention of this feat in any contemporary issues of *The Wykehamist*. There seems little doubt that Atkinson performed some such feat, but the details are now probably lost for all time. Gross says that in this match between 11 adults and 15 boys, H Brazier took 19 of the adults' wickets in the match. He just refers to the fixture as '15 Boys v 11 Men'. *The Cricketer* also reports on the feat, saying that H Brazier of Orange (NSW), aged 16, took 19 wickets and caught the other, with his side winning by 150 runs (a figure not consistent with the fuller scores given in local sources).

The *Sydney Morning Herald* names the bowler as Harry Brazier. The *Wellington Times* of 26 March states that he took the last five wickets of the match in seven balls, ending with a hat-trick.

The published scorecards show two players named W Dong in the Half Axes side. Players named W Dong and N Dong played together in other matches for Half Axes and for Stuart Town Juniors in March 1925, and it is therefore likely that both played in this game – but which batted at no. 5 and which at no. 6 is uncertain.

Robert Brooke includes this match in his list of instances of a player scoring a century and taking all-ten in the same match, included in 'Milestones' in *The Cricketer* August 1990 page 32. It is not in the equivalent list in *Cricket Quarterly* Summer 1967 page 135.

Brooke says that JH Lockton (who played 32 first-class matches for Surrey between 1919 and 1926) scored 105 and took 10-23 in an innings for Honor Oak.

The match has not been traced in the BNA, and is not noted in the contemporary *South London Observer*. More significantly, it is also not mentioned in MB Alexander's history of the Honor Oak club, either in the detailed season-by-season text or in the section of club records. These records list three instances by Lockton of a century and six wickets [but no more] in an innings in the same match, and also lists two performances by him of ten wickets in an innings – but nothing resembling the dual feat claimed by Brooke.

Very recently a source has come to light suggesting that Lockton's performance may have been for a side named Arthur Thorpe's XI, rather than for Honor Oak. This requires further investigation.

In Alfred James' *Statistical Appendix to the Centenary History of the New South Wales Districts Cricket Associations 1903 to 2003*, it is recorded (on page 38) that J O'Reilly and H Moorehouse shared a partnership of 245 for Warringa's ninth wicket, in this match in the Northern Suburbs A Grade Association.

The match is noted in the *Daily Telegraph* (Sydney) of 28 September 1925, which says that O'Reilly scored 225 and Moorehouse 91, and that their stand was worth 246 for the ninth wicket. The full scorecard, as above, is given on page 86 of *The Cricketer Winter Annual* for 1926/27. Although the performance was reported in some Australian newspapers, none has a scorecard.

DMS (Douglas) Wardlaw scored 125 of the 126 runs scored before he was out at the fall of the sixth wicket in Cranbrook's first innings. In the last two (eight-ball) overs that he faced, he first hit A Cooper for 29 (6444461) and then Bingham for 40 (666646W; out off the last ball of this over). His 125 consisted of 15 sixes, seven fours and seven singles.

The *Mercury* (Hobart) says he scored 118 rather than 125 in this innings (out at 119), and this score is also given in an edition of *The Cricketer* early in 1926. The fuller version in *The Cricketer Winter Annual* is preferred – not least because the scoring strokes as given there support the figure of 125, and the first innings scores correctly tally to 147.

Douglas Wardlaw played seven first-class matches for Tasmania between 1925/26 and 1928/29.

The D Wardlaw who batted for Bicheno is identified in *The Cricketer* as Don Wardlaw.

Robert Brooke includes this match in his list of instances of a player scoring a century and taking all-10 in the same match, included in 'Milestones' in *The Cricketer* August 1990 page 32. It is also in the equivalent list in *Cricket Quarterly* Summer 1967 page 135.

CQ says that FP Longton scored 104 and took 10-22 for Mr Pawle's XI in this match; Brooke names the player as PP Longton, but otherwise the details are the same. Both these sources date the match to 1929. However, there is a reference to it on page 243 of *The Cricketer* for 19 June 1937 which says the match was in 1927. No record of the performance has been traced in the BNA in either 1927 or 1929, using various possible spellings of the player's name (Langton, Langden etc).

The match and Hugo's performances were also briefly noted in e.g. the *Liverpool Echo* and the *Belfast Telegraph*, both of 10 March 1931. These reports are said to be sourced from a correspondent to the Johannesburg *Morning Post*: this may be the source of Gross's recording of the match as taking place in Johannesburg. They state that Hugo was a left-arm bowler, and that he took his nine-in-nine with the last three balls of his first over, and all six balls of his second over. It is unclear whether his tenth wicket, and the two runs he conceded, came in the course of the first three balls of his first over, or in a third over.

No further information on the game has been traced. The British Library holds the Bloemfontein-published newspaper *The Friend* for the years in question, but all their volumes for this period are declared to be unfit to show to researchers.

The match is referred to on pp 69-70 of Kersi Meher-Homji's *Out for a Duck*, in which he cites English writer Harvey Day as referring to this match in which Mortimer Road School "were dismissed for zero and though none of the St Bede's boys could manage a single between them, they won through a sundry".

Not recorded by Gross, and this match not traced in the BNA. Towards the end of the same season, the *Shields Daily Gazette* of 9 September records that Mortimer Road school had, on the previous day, lost to Stanhope Road school in the final of the local Thomas Coulson Memorial Cup (for elementary schools) – which Mortimer Road School had won in 1930. The newspaper includes photographs of both sides, and names the Mortimer Road side as J Bailey, W Bowman, N Burkett (capt), R Dixon, M Hickels, R Kell, G Miller, G Mortimer, E Pyle, A Richardson and R Surtees. This indicates that, despite their performance against Bede's Central School, Mortimer Road School did meet with some success during the season.

Or, if Mortimer Road School were good enough to reach the final of the cup competition in both 1930 and 1931, could it be that the details of the above match have been reversed over time, and it was Bede's that were dismissed for 0 rather than Mortimer Road School?

Robert Brooke includes this match in his list of instances of a player scoring a century and taking all-ten in the same match, included in 'Milestones' in *The Cricketer* August 1990 page 32. It is also in the equivalent list in *Cricket Quarterly* Summer 1967 page 135.

Brooke says that F Phillips scored 104 and took 10-58 in an innings for Watney's. *CQ*, which places the match at Barnes rather than Mortlake, give Phillips' score as 104*, but agrees 10-58.

The match has not been traced in the BNA. It is not mentioned in the contemporary *Norbury & Thornton Heath News*, which despite its name does not include among its extensive cricket coverage the scores of matches of either Norbury CC or Thornton Heath CC. It is reported as a news item (without scores) in *The Cricketer* (28 May 1932 page 106; the former bowler is here named as 'E Marten'), and is also mentioned in the *Chelmsford Chronicle* of 13 May 1932, which reports that EG Martin took 10-31 for the bachelors (i.e. Single), and leg-spinner Albert Knight took 10-24 for Married. (Note that this reverses the teams as compared with Gross's record of the event.)

There is no reference to the match in either the *Woodford Times* or the *Woodford & District Advertiser*, nor in the *Ilford Recorder*, *Ilford Guardian*, or *Eastern Counties Times*.

The *Bucks Free Press* does not give any initials of those in the Old Harvistians side. Gross says that the seventh-wicket partnership between Maxwell and Summers in the Cahn XI innings was worth 293, but there is no mention of the size of the partnership in the only newspaper report of the match that has been traced, or in the note of the match in EE Snow's detailed review of Cahn's 1934 season in volume 1 no. 4 of *Cricket Quarterly*.

The *Journal* does not give the number of Extras in the first innings of the Leicestershire Gentlemen. The batters' scores as given here add to 101; 108 is the innings total as given in the paper's scorecard, but its match report gives the total as 106.

The player named in the *Journal* as 'WE Beisiegel' was very probably the occasional Leicestershire CCC player WK Beisiegel. No other 'W Beisiegel' can be traced via ancestry.co.uk

In Alfred James' *Statistical Appendix to the Centenary History of the New South Wales Districts Cricket Associations 1903 to 2003*, it is recorded (on page 37) that F Munro and B Mills shared a partnership of 423 for Pennant Hills' first wicket, in this match in the Northern Districts Association.

Summary scores have been found in the *Sydney Morning Herald* of 18 and 25 March 1935. The Pennant Hills score of 473 is given in both editions of the paper; other details here are from the edition of 25 March (18 March gives Mills 187, Munro 216, McDonald 7-150). Neither paper gives any details of the Carlingford innings, but that of 25th gives the result as a win for Pennant Hills. Neither paper confirms the size of the stand between Mills and Munro.

The number of balls delivered in his final over of each innings is not stated.

The total of 15 for the Workers' second innings is taken from the *Fremantle Advocate*, which has a full report of the game and gives this figure in two places (and says that only four batters broke their ducks and that the highest individual score in this innings was 7). Other papers generally give the total as 18, but I have followed the fuller report in the most local newspaper.

This was a match in the Fremantle Mercantile Association. Gross erroneously describes the fixture as Great Fremantle v East Fremantle at Perth.

A report in the *Evening Despatch* (Birmingham) of 27 June 1936 tells of a side named Spare Parts being dismissed for 0 in a match in the Moss Gear company's inter-sectional competition on the previous evening, with R Howard taking six wickets for 0 and R King four wickets for 0. No other details are given, and there is no indication of the order in which the two sides batted.

No further details of the match have yet been traced.

Based in Erdington, Birmingham until 1966, Moss Gear were producers of gearboxes etc for motor vehicles. From the description in the *Despatch*, this was an internal match between different parts of the company. Whether 'Spare Parts' was the name given to a team of cricketers who did not belong to one of the main competing sections of the company, or whether it was representing a section of the company that was itself known as 'Spare Parts', is not known.

Gross records that KR Davidson [also of Yorkshire, etc] scored a century (101*) and took four wickets in four balls for Staten Island.

The feat is confirmed in *The Cricketer* 25 July 1936 page 390, which refers to it being recorded in a match “at the beginning of this month”. The opposing side is named in *The Cricketer* as Crescent Athletic Hamilton Club.

An approach to Staten Island CC in 2021 did not produce any additional information about this match. Nothing has been found about it in the *New York Times* or *New York Herald Tribune*, while the 1936 editions of the more local *Staten Island Advance* newspaper have proved impossible to track down.

Brooke says that DD Beard scored 107* and took 10-39 in an innings for Palmerston North Boys High School. If this was the future Test cricketer of that name, he would have been 16 or 17 years old.

Stuart Leighton of the Palmerston North BHS Old Boys' Association has indicated strongly that Don Beard never recorded such a feat for the school side. There is no reference to such a performance by Beard, whether for the school or for any other side, and whether in 1936/37 or 1939, in any newspaper currently (April 2023) in Papers Past.

Alerted by Harry Watton, citing a reference on page 63 of the Midlands Club Cricket Conference Yearbook for 1963 which reports that R Ketteringham took all ten wickets for no runs for Wrotham Park Estate – a club in the Potters Bar area of [then] North Middlesex.

No reference to this occurrence has been traced in the BNA (searching on Ketteringham, Wrotham and Potters Bar), or in *The Cricketer*. Neither is it reported in contemporary issues of the *Hatfield and Potters Bar Gazette*. The latter newspaper has the scorecard of just a single match by Wrotham Park Estate in the 1937 season, against South Mymms in late May, in which Ketteringham took 8 wickets in South Mymms' total of 41 all out (edition of 4 June 1937). So at least we know that his existence was bona fide!

This lists only ten batsmen in the Clayhall innings; it is here assumed that the missing batsman scored the three runs needed to make the scorecard balance, though his position in the batting order is unknown. Proffitt's all-round performance is also noted in the *Ilford Recorder* of 3 June 1937, but it is not mentioned in the *Ilford Guardian*, the *Woodford Times* or the *Woodford & District Advertiser*.

Stanley Proffitt played seven first-class matches for Essex in the 1937 season, the first of them on 2 June, three days after the above performance.

The report of the match in the *Hindustan Times* includes a scorecard for the first day only. This confirms the two batters' scores, and shows only one not-out batter – from which it may be inferred that the Maharajah was out at the end of the first day's play, thus giving the size of the partnership as 413.

The match report says that the Maharajah took 62 minutes to reach 100, and 142 minutes to reach 200. Amarnath's 100 took 160 minutes.

Gross's refers to the visiting side as Jam Antia's XI, but this is thought likely to be an error for JD Antia's XI, a Bombay-based side that played a similar match v Patiala in December 1934 (CA scorecard 168080) and various others elsewhere in India and Ceylon around this time. The *Hindustan Times* refers to the side as 'The Parsees'.

The tenth-wicket partnership in the Griffith innings was worth 200*. Gross gives Green's score as 50*, but the *Riverine Grazier* says more plausibly – see below - that his score was 11*, and this is accepted here.

The report in *The Sun* says that Len Bowditch went in at number 11 with the score 97-9, and scored his 183* in 60 minutes, with 19 fours and 13 sixes. He reportedly reached 100* in 34 minutes, and had scored 100 before his partner Green had scored a run.

Len Bowditch (Griffith) and Fred Bowditch (Temora) were brothers.

Gross names the fixture as Temora v Griffith at Temora, but the *Grazier* confirms the venue as Griffith.

Ernest Gross recorded that MF McConnell performed three hat-tricks in an innings for Laxton House in this match, at one stage taking seven wickets in nine balls. This is not noted at any point in *The Laxtonian*, which also makes no comment regarding McConnell's performance of all-ten.

13 players are listed in the magazine as appearing for each of these houses in the house competition in 1939, but it is not known who were the 11s in this particular match. The 13s are as follows:

Gross records that in this match, 783 runs were scored in 365 minutes (which equates to around 128 runs per hour). He gives the scores as Standard Bank 463-3, Lever Bros 253 and 67-9. There is no specific reference to this being a one-day match, but that would seem likely.

The above details are taken from a brief item in *The Cricketer Spring Annual* for 1940, page 75. If correct, the total number of runs scored was 'only' 775 rather than 783. According to this source, Hope's 253* was made in 63 minutes, with 36 sixes.

In Alfred James' *Statistical Appendix to the Centenary History of the New South Wales Districts Cricket Associations 1903 to 2003*, it is recorded (on page 38) that RJ Wild and V Bowden shared a partnership of 328 for Burwood United's seventh wicket, in this match in the Western Suburbs B Grade Association.

Additional information has been traced in the *Sydney Morning Herald*, 20 and 30 November 1940, but the paper does not confirm (or refute) the figure of 328 as being the size of the partnership between Wild and Bowden.

No further information about this performance has yet been traced. It is not noted in any other newspaper currently (April 2023) in Trove.

'Navy XI' is the team-name given by Gross. The side was actually an XI from a Royal Navy ship in harbour at Port Said, but wartime restrictions prevented it being named.

The Cricketer records the progress of the match as follows: "After each side had completed an innings, an extra hour's batting for both teams was agreed upon, HMS totalling 76 for 3 and Navy House 76 for 6." From that description, it is inferred that the 'Navy XI' batted first, and that their second innings was closed at the agreed time.

Gross records that IP Campbell (later of Oxford University and Kent) scored 205 out of 236 in a house match at Canford School in 1941. It is not clear whether 236 was his side's all-out total (in which case he scored 86.86% of his team's runs in the innings, or a higher proportion if extras are excluded), or just the number of runs added while Campbell was at the wicket.

The match is not noted in any newspaper currently (March 2020) in the BNA.

Canford School's magazine is available online, and although the issue covering the wartime cricket seasons mention that Campbell was in School House (hence the part-title of this match above), no reference to such a performance is made in the magazine.

The match scorecard may be given in a contemporary issue of *The Cricketer* or in the *Wimborne & District News* (not available at the British Library), but both seem unlikely for a house match at a relatively minor public school. Another possible source – Campbell's own autobiography – has yet to be investigated.

Robert Brooke includes this match in his list of instances of a player scoring a century and taking all-ten in the same match, included in 'Milestones' in *The Cricketer* August 1990 page 32. It is also in the equivalent list in *Cricket Quarterly* Summer 1967 page 135.

Brooke says that AH Andrews scored 106* and took all ten wickets (for an unknown number of runs) for the NZ Divisional XI, and dates the match to 1941. *CQ* was unable to name Andrews' opponents, and dates the match to '1941 or 1942', but its other details match those of Brooke.

No reference to such a feat has been traced in Papers Past for either year.

Davies' performance is reported in the *Birmingham Mail* of 22 May 1943 (Davies played county cricket for Warwickshire), and is also noted in *The Cricketer* of 22 May 1943, on page 63.

Mysteriously, there is no reference to this match in the *Hornsey Journal* of 14 or 21 May, even though other Alexandra Park matches are well covered. Maybe the fact that this game was on a Thursday meant that it missed the deadline for the 14 May paper, and by 21 May it was 'old news'? The match is however noted – but with no detail (not even a mention of Davies' performance) – in the *Weekly Telegraph for Waltham Abbey, Cheshunt & Districts* of 21 May, which is the source of the all-out score of the Cheshunt innings, and of the team's name as 'Cheshunt Thursday'.

Between 4.12pm and 6.02pm – including a 12-minute break between the innings - 17-year-old Linton (Lin) Bridges recorded a total of 12 stumpings across the two Hawthorn-East Melbourne innings, eight of them in the second innings; during this time he also recorded a catch. Ten of the stumpings were off the bowling of leg-spinner Murray Exelby, whose match figures were 13-52. Nine of the H-EM batters were dismissed 'stumped' in one innings or the other, although only three were dismissed in this way in both innings. In their second innings, Baird, Ahern and Young were stumped off successive deliveries (two off Exelby, one off Carson).

In the season's previous meeting of these two sides, on 9 October 1943, Exelby had taken 14-66 (7-14, 7-52), but finished on the losing side. Only three of his 14 wickets were stumpings, all in the second innings; the wicketkeeper on this occasion was W Gregg and not Bridges. In all matches in the 1943/44 season for Brunswick, Bridges recorded 62 dismissals – 19 catches and 43 stumpings.

Harry Watton found reference to this match in a letter from 'BWH' to the *Surrey Advertiser*, 26 August 1944. The game took place in France just a few weeks after D-Day.

The letter says that Beard took wickets with all the deliveries of his first over (8 in 8), and took two more wickets with successive deliveries in his second over. There is a reference in the letter to all ten wickets being taken with successive deliveries, and all bowled out, but this claimed performance is not 100% clear from the wording of the remainder of the letter.

No sequence by Beard, of any length, is recorded by Gross in this (or any other) match. He played club cricket for Chiddingfold in Surrey.

Beard's claimed figures of 10 for 0 are not listed by Gross, and neither is his alleged performance of 8 in 8 or better. All in all, one's suspicions are seriously aroused by these claims.
